## Good Competition And Quality In The Livestock Show At Eastern Kings Ex.

Competition in the dairy cattle classes at the Eastern King's Exhibition was quite keen yesterday as exhibitors in the Holsteins, Ayrshires, Jersey and Guernsey classes divided honors before a good sized crowd of spectators around the show ring.

The prize for showing the best dairy cow was won by Ernest Stead of Bay Fortune with his well developed Ayrshire.

Lincoln Dewar of New Perth and R. L. Burge of St. Peter's topped the winners in the Holstein classes. Mr. Dewar won eight firsts, six seconds, a third and a fourth as well as showing the champion male and female animals.

Mr. Burge won four firsts, two seconds and three fourths.

Other exhibitors who won prizes included Albert Wood, Preston Bryenton, Charles MacDonald, Wm. Bryenton, Howard Dixon, Cliff Hambley, Gerald Coffin, Zella McInnis, Dan MacDonald, Abden Howlett, Ralph MacDonald and Robert Jackson. The judge was Morris Deacon.

Ernest Underhay, Bay Fortune, was the major winner in the Jersey class with eight firsts, three seconds and a fourth, together with champion male and female. Stanley Burke of New Perth was runner-up with one first, two seconds and two thirds. Ralph MacDonald won a fourth and third in the same class. The judge was L. W. Roper.

Edwin Reid and Sons of Rollo Bay were the big winners in the Ayrshire class having seven firsts, two seconds, a third and fourth, together with champion male, reserve champion female, and champion junior Ayrshire.

Brent Stead, Bay Fortune won the champion female, reserve champion male and reserve champion junior Ayrshire together with two firsts, four seconds, three thirds and a fourth. Other winners were Robert White, Alban Wood, Vernon Wood, Zita McLaugh, James McInnis, James Mallard, Henry Mallard, James Hughes, John Gorman, Martha Leslie, Gordon Leslie, and Martina Hughes. The judge was L. W. Roper.

The beef breeds of Hereford and Shorthorn were also well filled. L. J. Buell of Murray Harbour led with champion male and female, and seven firsts, three seconds and a third. Leith Townshend, Souris won four firsts, four seconds, two thirds and a fourth. Other winners included Peter MacAulay, Joe MacAulay, and Ralph MacDonald.

John and Mary Dupasquair, St. Peter's Bay won every section in the Shorthorn class except the Shorthorn heifer grade won by Abden Howlett of Gowan Brae. Besides the champion male and female, the famous Dupasquair herd won nine firsts, five seconds, a third and fourth. A special feature during the cattle show was the selection of the best showman by Mr. L. W. Roper. Arnold Dixon won the first prize, with Isabel Stead taking second place.

The champion draft mare was won by Clifford Townshend of Rollo Bay, and other winners being

The sheep class was exceptionally large with an excellent showing of Shropshire and Oxford breeds. Preston Bryenton was the major winner in the Shropshire breed and Ernest Underhay in the Oxford breed. Howard Nantop won the big prize with the champion ram of the show, champion Oxford ewe along with six other firsts. Other winners were John Robertson, J. B. MacIsaac, Frank MacAulay and MacCormack Bros. The judge was Alex Hamilton.

The poultry class was also well represented, and Mr. F. A. Driscoll spent considerable time deciding winners. John Robertson with five firsts, two seconds and a third to lead the field of winners which included Francis Grant, Elaine MacPhee, David MacDonald, Charles MacAulay, Edwin Reid and Son, Ethan Garrit, Mrs. Wallace Steele, Shahan, Alva Townshend and Henry Mallard.

Frank MacAulay and Sons of Souris Line Road led the field with their Yorkshires in a well contested field, winning the champion male and female, 10 firsts and two seconds. Elmer Peters, Rollo Bay won the champion bacon hog of the show, and Matthew and MacLean's special prize for single bacon hog. Other winners were MacCormack Bros., Abden Howlett, and Andrew Peters and Sons. The judge was Alex Hamilton.
