Ottawa Grabs Top Spot In Edging Montreal 26-24

MONTREAL (CP)—Ottawa Rough Riders grabbed first place in the Eastern Football Conference Monday when Moe Racine booted a 49-yard field goal on the final play to provide a 26-24 win over Montreal Alouettes. The win, Ottawa's second over Montreal this season, gave the Rough Riders 12 points and a six-point first place edge over Hamilton Tiger-Cats in the standings. Montreal was left sharing third spot with Toronto Argonauts in a six-point tie. All four clubs have four games to play. Racine, a 230-pound tackle in his fourth campaign with Ottawa, belted the ball cleanly through the uprights after the Riders moved into position with an eight-play drive starting from their own 23-yard line. The line of scrimmage was the Montreal 52. A fourth-quarter scoring outburst by Montreal—two touchdowns, a convert and a single—left Ottawa trailing 24-23 before Racine's kick. **SCORES ON KICKOFF** Bobby Lee Thompson's twisting 106-yard run for a touchdown on a kickoff highlighted the Montreal surge. With a little more than four minutes left, Bobby Jack Oliver's field goal try was wide. But the ball soared over the dead ball line for a single that sent Montreal in front.
