

Royalty H. & S. Hear Talk On Orthodontics

Dr. B.J. O'Meara, director of Dental Health for P.E.I. was guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Central Royalty Home and School Association, held at the school on Tuesday evening, January 14th.

His subject was orthodontics the specialty of straightening crooked teeth and was most interesting and instructive. He preceded his talk by a film which showed very clearly the definite harm caused by crooked teeth, such as personal embarrassment, social handicap and business handicap. He stated that the theory that nothing can be done before the age of twelve is not true. Instead he emphasized the importance of preventive treatment since approximately twenty-five percent of children are affected by this condition.

Dr. O'Meara was introduced by Mr. John MacAleer and a vote of thanks was extended by Mr. Art MacRae.

Mrs. A.M. Johnston presided over the business meeting during which the routine business was conducted.

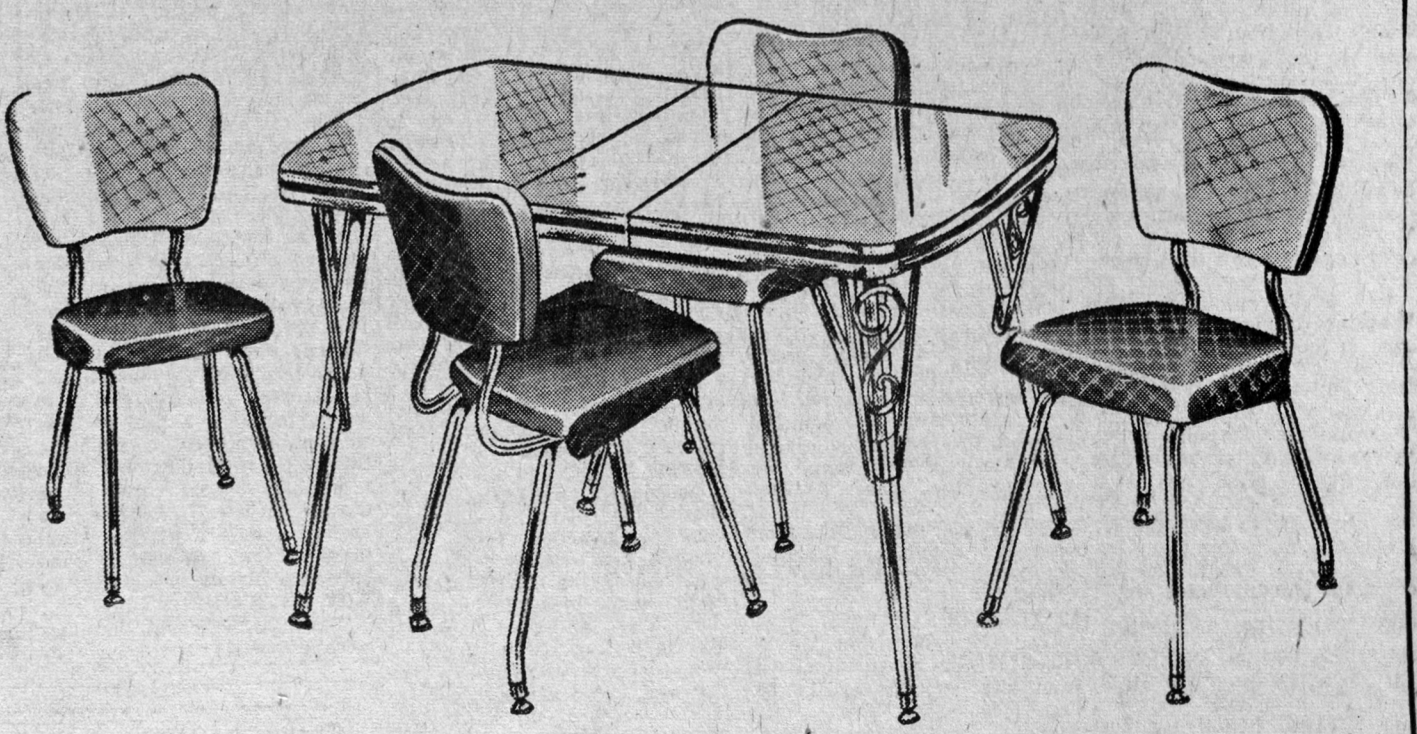
