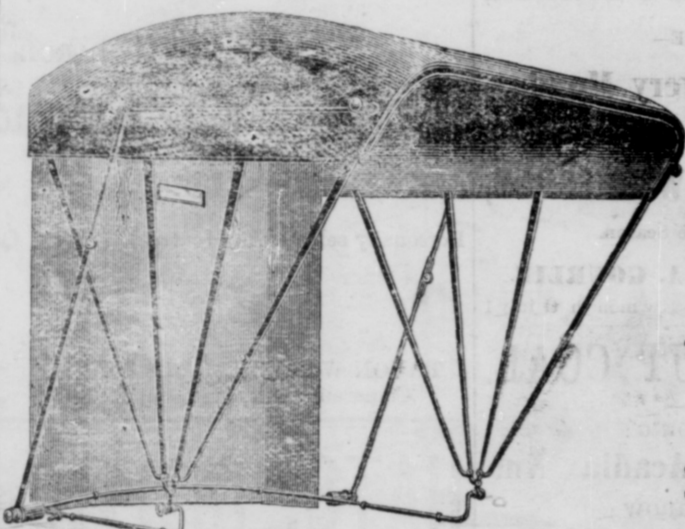

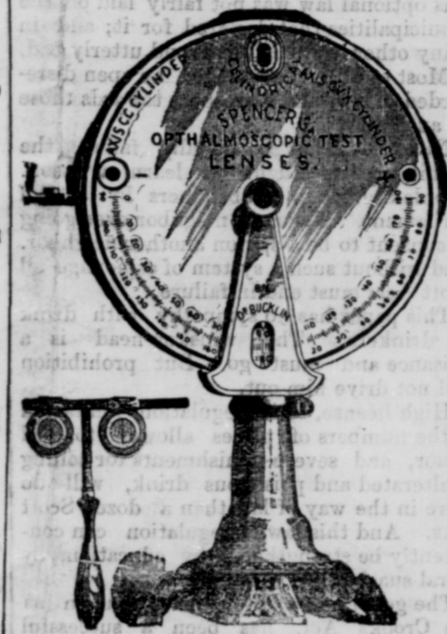

Meeting of Presbytery.

At the meeting of Presbytery held in
Summerside last week,—

Rev. Mr. Carr reported that he had
moderated in a call at West Cape, that it
resulted in favor of Mr. Thomas Corbett,
that it was cordial and unanimous, and that
the congregation guaranteed \$450 and a
manse and glebe. Messrs. J. K. Ramsay
and Wm. Thompson were received and
heard in support of the call. On motion,
Mr. Carr's report was approved, the call
sustained as a regular gospel call, and the
clerk instructed to forward it to Mr. Cor-
bett, requesting an answer at his earliest
convenience.

It having appeared from an extract
minute of the Pictou Presbytery that Rev.
A. McL. Sinclair had accepted the call to
Belfast, and that he would be at the dis-
posal of this Presbytery for induction on
the 1st May, it was agreed that his induc-
tion take place on the 16th inst., at 11
o'clock, a. m., in St. John's church, Belfast;
that Rev. D. B. McLeod preach on that
occasion; that Rev. J. M. McLeod address
the congregation in English and Rev.
E. Gillies in Gaelic. Rev. D. B. McLeod
was appointed to exchange with Mr. M. J.
McLeod on Sabbath, 6th inst., and serve
the edict of induction. It was agreed that
Mr. J. M. McLeod's trials for license be
heard at the meeting in Belfast on 16th
inst.; that Rev. Geo. McMillan examine in
Theology, Rev. Mr. Spencer in Church
History, Rev. D. B. McLeod in Hebrew,
and Rev. Mr. Carruthers in Greek.

Rev. D. M. Gordon, B. D., was nomi-
nated as Moderator of the General Assem-
bly, to meet in Halifax in June next.

Notices from Presbyteries were read, in-
timating that application would be made to
the next General Assembly for leave to
receive as ministers of the Presbyterian
Church in Canada the following, viz.:—
Mr. John M. Wilson, licentiate of the
Church of Scotland; Rev. Mark Scott, of
the Free Church of Scotland; Rev. W.
McGregor, of the Baptist Church, and Rev.
G. C. Mousseau, of the Congregational
Church.

The committee appointed to visit East
St. Peter's reported that that congregation
had increased their minister's salary to \$750
and a manse.

Rev. Mr. Fisher read a report of the
work done by the Women's Presbyterial
Society during the past nine months. The
following resolution, moved by Rev. Mr.
Spencer, was unanimously adopted:—

"Having listened to the most cheering
report of the Presbyterial Society of this
Island, in connection with the W. F. M. S.
of our church, this Presbytery would express
its warm interest in the object and work of
the W. F. M. S., its pleasure in the en-
couraging report just read, its gratitude to
God for the work already accomplished by
them, and its increasing fruitfulness, and
would cordially commend the work of these
ladies to the continued blessing of the Great
Head of the Church.

T. C. James submitted a carefully pre-
pared report on the financial state of the
church. The report was most encouraging
showing marked progress over preceding
years in almost every department of the
church's work. The consideration of this
report was deferred until the next quarter-
ly meeting.

Rev. Mr. Carr submitted the report on
the state of religion. This report contained
much that was encouraging, and also
furnished material for serious reflection on
the part of the office-bearers and members
of our church. It was agreed that the report
be received and considered in conference
with the public at the next quarterly meet-
ing in Zion Church.

The report on Sabbath Schools and tem-
perance were also read and received, and
their consideration deferred until next
quarterly meeting.

Rev. Mr. Carr was appointed to moder-
ate in a call in Richmond Bay West at such
time as the congregation shall be ready to
proceed. Rev. Mr. Coffin was appointed
moderator of the session of West Cape, in-
stead of Rev. Geo. Fisher.

The following appointments were made
for vacant congregation, for the month of
May, viz.:—
Kensington and New London—Sabbaths
13th and 20th, Mr. J. M. McLeod; Mr.
E. Corbett,
West Cape—Sabbaths 13th, 20th and
27th, Mr. W. L. Clay.

Cavendish,—13th Rev. John Hutchin-
son; and 20th, Rev. George Fisher.

The next quarterly meeting of Presbytery
will be held in Zion Church on the first
Tuesday of August, at 11 a. m. The Pres-
bytery adjourned to meet in Belfast on
16th inst at 11 a. m.

In Favor of License.

Rev. Benjamin W. Roger Taylor, for-
merly well known in Nova Scotia and New
Brunswick, has been creating a sensation in
Riverside, California. A vigorous effort
has been made against the saloons in that
town, in which all the clergy but himself
co-operated with the W. C. T. U. A com-
mittee of ladies waited upon Brother Tay-
lor, who promised to promise to preach
a sermon on the question. At the appoint-
ed time the Episcopal congregation was re-
inforced by 200 members of the W. C. T.
U. The preacher completely astonished the
audience and disgusted the 200 ladies
aforesaid, by boldly advocating high license,
the moderate use of California wines and
other light drinks, and an open saloon in
preference to the underground and back
ally drinking places. The ladies replied to
the sermon by holding an indignation meet-
ing, at which the principal address was de-
livered by Mrs. E. J. Davies, nee Miss
Mattie Cunningham, formerly of Antigonish
and Cape Canso. Mrs. Davies spoke in
such a vigorous manner and handled Mr.
Taylor so ably, that the local papers de-
voted three columns of space to a report of
her remarks.

A Steamer for Ice Navigation.

The following is a description of Gote-
borg's Icebreaker, used in the Kattegat,
translated from the Swedish. Length, 134
feet; breadth, 35 feet; depth of hold, 19
feet; draught of water with 24 hours fuel,
12 feet 6 inches, with ballast, tank full,
and water tank for ward empty, at least 15
feet.

The vessels keel, stern, stern-posts, plat-
ing, rudder and rudder stock, are of Gar-
ford iron, and frames and reverse frames of
Bessemer material, the frames of 0.15 and
the reverse frames of 0.30 alloy of coal, all
of Motala manufacture, the rest of English
material, quality, best. The dimen-
sions of the parts are: Keel, 7x4 inches;
forestem, 10x2½ inches, decreasing upwards
to 7x2½ inches; propeller sternpost, 8x5
inches, wholly hammered or forged; rudder
stock, 7 inches in diameter, plating, half an
inch. The frame angle irons, 4x3½x6½
inches; distance 12 inches in the forepart;
reverse frames 3½x3½ inches; going up to
the deck, in the engine room double the
width, one reaching down to upper part of
the bilge; a floor for every frame 19½x7½
inches, reaching up in the bilge to the
double height of floor. Keelson 12x½
inches, double angle-irons above and below,
with a rider plate on top, 9x½ inches. Bilge
keelsons three on each side. Plating from
stem 7-8 inch, decreasing aft to 5-8, and 30
inches wide; all plates in the bottom 7-8
inch, decreasing to 1-2 inch. Deck of 1-4
inch plates with wood covering of 2 inches.
Water-tight bulk heads 5-16 plates supported
by 3½x2½ inch single iron beams with
stanchions under each beam. Riveting, keel
and sternpost double zigzag riveting. Plat-
ing, double riveted except streaks in bottom
of forefoot of vessel, which are triple
riveted. The vessel is divided by seven
watertight bulkheads in eight compart-
ments with three ballast tanks. The
ballast tank aft extends from aft to 30 feet
forward. Ahead of this tank is a compart-
ment 20 feet long, provided with a water
tight iron passage. Forward of this com-
partment and separated therefrom by a
water-tight bulkhead in the engine room
about 19 feet long. The boiler room is
separated from the engine room by two
water tight bulkheads placed about 12 feet
apart, and connected by a tunnel and water
tight door serving for a passage between
the engine and boiler rooms. In the space
between these bulkheads, the supply of
coal is placed. From off the boiler room is
a compartment about 14 feet long provided
with a water-tight passage for the trimming
tank; a water-tight bulkhead separates this
compartment from the peakroom.

The engine is combined, high and low
pressure, with surface condenser, construct-
ed to evolve 700 indicated H. P., with a
rapidity of the piston of 400 feet in each
minute, with a working pressure of not
more than 75 lbs. to the square inch. All
axles, pivots and piston rods are 25 to 30
per cent. larger than customary for engines
of above named power. All bottom valves
are provided with steam turning means.

A larger and smaller donkey pump is
on board, the former for the discharge of
the water tanks, the latter for feeding the
boilers; the tanks may also be discharged
by the circulation and engine pump. A
donkey boiler is in the engine room and
also a separate condensing system to be
used when going through ice. The boilers
are two in number, built of best metalis
steam boiler plate, the dimensions in
accordance with Lloyd's rules, and cold
water tested to 75 per cent. higher than
the working pressure and connected with
the donkey boiler. The vessel is provided
with steam steering gear and a patent
steam windlass and has a speed of a little
over eleven knots.

During a trip in the Kattegat the vessel
ran with an even speed of five knots for a
long distance through a hard twelve inch
thick ice bridge, and afterwards through a
field of about one English mile where the
ice lay packed and hard frozen together in
several layers, in the middle of which the
vessel stopped, when by actual measure-
ment of the thickness of the pack it proved
to be ten feet. After having backed for
some distance and going on again, the
vessel passed through without stopping.
The after tank at the time was full of
water and the vessel drawing 18 feet aft
and only a trifle forward."

It is recommended that a similar vessel with
improvements be constructed for use
between Prince Edward Island and the
Mainland to take the place of the govern-
ment steamer Northern.
