The writ for the election in Cape Breton has been issued. Nomination 16th October, polling 23d.

The son of Gen. Sherman and the son of Senator Kernan, of New York, have become novitiates of the Jesuits of England.

Hon. Mr. Moreton and Lady Sophia McNamara, of the Marquis of Lorne's household, will return to England next month.

The Sparta, Ga., Times wants the Legislature to make confederate bills legal tender for their face value, in order to make money "plentiful."

Crime and drunkenness have increased in London during the past year, according to the police reports. The number of arrests for drunkenness was 42,805.

Many of the New Hampshire churches are expressing great dissatisfaction with the new law taxing church property on all sums above \$10,000.

A recent official return of the national debt of Great Britain puts the exact figure on the first of April at £778,078,840. In 1878-9, £803,126 was paid off and £6,288, 123 added.

New York has five candidates for Governor: Cornell, Republican; Robinson, Tilden Democrat; Kelly, Tammany, Democrat; Lewis, Greenbacker; Mears, Prohibitionist.
