Much Elbowing Foreseen In Left Wing Politics Here

OTTAWA (CP)—The next few years likely will be marked by a good deal of elbowing, jostling and squeezing in the left wing of Canadian politics.

The decision of the Canadian Labor Congress at its Winnipeg convention last week to seek formation of a broad new left-wing "movement" aroused around the CCF raises the question: How much room is there on the left for two main political parties? An answer may not be given until the next federal election four or five years from now.

In any event the Liberal party can be expected to play a big role in helping to shape the answer.

Liberal Leader Pearson, who during the election campaign declared that his is the party of the future, has declined comment for the present on the developments of the CCF convention. An aide said he wanted first to learn more about what happened at Winnipeg, and to confer with party associates and with the party's friends in the labor movement.

The CCF decision left many questions to be settled in the future. The congress executive is to open discussions promptly with various groups—specifically the CCF—to draft the shape of the movement. The convention resolution mentioned going after support of labor, farmers, profes-

Motor vessel, Shirley Anne W. of 89 net tons arrived in port at Wood Islands Sunday 4:30 p.m. from Pleasant Bay, Magdalen Islands with a cargo of 2,000 barrels of herring to be used as lobster bait.

The Shirley Anne W., formerly a mine sweeper, is owned and operated by Captain Royal White out of Murray Harbour and carries a crew of five besides her captain.

Captain White advised that herring prices prevailing are similar to those of the past three years, but at present the supply is scarce.

Housing Project Contract Let

OTTAWA (CP)—The works department announced Tuesday a contract valued at \$1,727,041 has been awarded to the Newfoundland Engineering and Construction Company Limited of St. John's, Nfld., for the construction of a 146-unit subsidized rental housing project in the provincial capital.

Work is to start within two weeks and the cost of the project will be shared by the provincial and federal governments in an agreement reached under the National Housing Act.

The new project, which will consist of 116 row housing units and 30 apartment units, will be built on land made available through an earlier land assembly project.
