NEW YORK (AP) — Selected aircrafts, electronics and rubbers set the pace as industrial gains in an irregular stock market Monday. Profit taking was much in evidence in various sections of the list.

The averages were helped considerably by rises of 3/4 for American Telephone, 2 1/2 for Du Pont and a point for Chrysler.

General Dynamics lost 1/2 and Philadelphia and Reading dropped 8/16 despite their agreement to organize a jointly-owned chemical company.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose 80 cents to \$225.30 with the industrials up \$2.

Aluminum Ltd. lost 1/4 point in the Canadian list. Also lower were International Nickel, McIntyre Pulpine (off 1/4) and Hudson Bay Mining, Canadian Pacific and Dome Mines closed higher.

Among Canadians on the American Stock Exchange, Canadian Marconi, Brazilian Traction, Molycenite and Scurry-Rainbow oil were the gainers.

WEEKEND CRASH KILLS

Fuller President

HAWTHORNE, Nev. (AP)—The president of Fuller Brush Company and his wife were killed Saturday in a high-speed crash near this western Nevada town.

Alfred Howard Fuller, 47, and his 46-year-old wife, Nevada, died when their sports car blew a tire and hurtled out of control into the desert about 30 miles east of here.

Fuller, of West Hartford, Conn., was the son of Alfred C. Fuller, chairman of the Fuller Brush Company board of directors.

FOUNDED COMPANY The father, born near Grand Pre, N.S., also founded the company.

Under Sheriff Frank Souza said the Fullers' high-powered sports car was travelling "at terrific speed" when a rear tire blew out and the vehicle shot off the highway into the desert and flipped over several times.

Fuller was killed outright. His wife died en route to hospital.
