Future Of Forum Seems In Doubt

Facing unexpectedly heavy repair costs to the Forum, the City of Charlottetown is believed to be giving serious consideration to the erection of a brand new ice palace, possibly as part of a future sports complex.

Physical condition of the present rink has deteriorated to such an extent replacement costs are believed to be impracticable levels because of financing requirements.

Under the present system too great a strain is placed on available facilities, particularly on a Saturday, when children from the entire metropolitan area keep the ice surface constantly occupied throughout the day.

It is believed plans for the immediate future operation call for use of the forum by city residents only in order to assure youngsters here of sufficient time. Another factor involved is finances as at present each Charlottetown youngster taking part in the minor hockey program is registered at a cost of only \$1 while those from outside the city pay \$2. To meet basic costs it would be necessary to raise that latter fee to somewhere close to \$15.

VITAL REPAIRS

When the big rink was purchased a few years ago for a cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000 it was known money would have to be spent to put it in top condition. However, it is believed it has already cost an additional \$50,000 and far greater expenditures are in sight if the place is to be kept operating. There is speculation the overall cost would be greater than warranted because it is known a sum of about \$50,000 will be needed almost immediately for vital repairs.

Some negotiations have been underway with directors of the Exhibition Association for installation of an ice plant in the Coliseum. However, this building, originally constructed by the provincial government and orig-

inally known as the Jones Pavilion, lacks many of the facilities needed. These would include dressing and wash rooms.

If a new forum is built there is a strong possibility of it being constructed in the area where the new high school is to go. It might be erected both as a 1967 Centennial project — for which it would qualify — thus allowing the city to obtain the joint federal-provincial grant of \$2 per head of population.

CLOSE TO TOTAL

As part of a winter works program it would also be eligible for a federal rebate of 50 per cent of labour costs. These amounts added to what would be obtained through sale of the present forum are believed to total close to the overall cost of construction.

At least the total cost, it is thought, would not be more than \$50,000 over available funds and the whole figure could be amortized over a 20-year period. Since this \$50,000 figure is about the same as the city will face for repairs the project becomes feasible because of the amortization factor.

As matters stand now any repair costs have to met out of current revenues and since the latter are currently utilized to the last penny the possibility of extending the cost over a long period has obvious desirable features.

Exactly what it would mean to the children of Parkdale and Sherwood to be barred from use of the forum can be imagined and yet city councillors cannot be faulted for failing to further subsidize residents from outside the limits.

It is believed the matter is so urgent the city will take almost immediate action. It is strongly rumored interest in purchasing the Forum has been shown by some business enterprises here and sale of the Forum is not just a hope. Whether or not the city can obtain the close to \$150,000 it has poured into the building is another matter.

Cattle Entry List Near 600 For Fair

The Atlantic Winter Fair opens its third successive season in Halifax Oct. 30 with a jam-packed eight-day program. Nearly 600 head of cattle from the Maritimes, Ontario and Maine farms will be entered in this year's fair.

The fair, now recognized as Atlantic Canada's biggest agricultural showpiece, will feature hundreds of other top quality livestock, garden and field crops, arts, handicrafts and industrial exhibits as well as daily entertainment for the entire family.

Livestock entries have now been compiled and heading the list in the cattle division are 99 head of Holsteins, closely followed by 91 Scotch Shorthorns, 88 Ayrshires, 74 Aberdeen Angus, 64 Jerseys and 36 Guernseys and Dual Purpose Shorthorns.

Cattle to be judged this year are classified under the Harry Hays formula and Fair officials report that although the number of entries is about the same as

1964, the number of livestock exhibitors has increased considerably.

Heavy entries are also reported in the light horse division with competitors coming from as far west as Edmonton and many United States points. More than 150 light horses and 91 draft horses are entered as well as 200 sheep and 31 swine.

New, attractive products manufactured in the Atlantic Provinces will be on display in the industrial and commercial booths as well as farmers' produce, homecrafts and other exhibits.

DAILY SHOWS

One of the highlights of the Fair will be the daily horse shows with top entries from many parts of Canada and New England competing for honors. A feature will be the Grand Prix Jumping Stake, with prize money totalling \$1,000.

Other top entertainment will include Hollywood's most well-known sound effects man, Wes Harrison, a variety musical

Ottawa To Be Pressed For Lobster Trap Limit

Mr. Corney, the 21st president of the Fisheries Council of Canada, in stressing the importance of the Fisheries Council, said that the total fish sales in Canada run from \$250,000,000 to \$300,000,000 per year.

The Fisheries Council of Canada represents over 90 per cent of this yearly income and involves between 10,000 and 12,000 fishermen in associations throughout the Dominion who are members of the Fisheries Council.

TIED TOGETHER
