TORONTO, (CP)—Police of suburban York township are investigating the death by asphyxiation of Mr. and Mrs. James Gosley. The Gosleys were found dead in their basement apartment Tuesday.
Coroner Dr. Stephen Evelyn said the death was accidental, but police inspector Walter Corson said he was continuing investigation.
Police said gas fumes were so bad they could be smelled outside. They said the couple's 11-year-old son had been sent to stay with relatives. Gosley was 38 and his wife, Christine, 32.
The Gosleys came to Toronto three years ago from Prince Edward Island. Mr. Gosley operated a car painting business.
