**Hiram Millar Keeps Title At Montague Regatta**

MONTAGUE — Hiram Millar, Murray Harbor North, in his lobster boat "Breeze Quiet", won the free-for-all, and the MacInyre Trophy for the second consecutive year at the Lower Montague Regatta yesterday afternoon.

The largest crowd watched the different classes and were thrilled with the many close finishes and near spills.

John A. MacDonald, M.P. for Kings, officially opened the regatta, and remarked that the setting for the Lower Montague Regatta was one of the finest he had ever seen with historic Point Aroua across the bay, Georgetown with its excellent all-year round harbor guarding the bay entrance, and the beautiful shoreline and beaches of Lower Montague.

He said it afforded him great pleasure to be present, and he offered his congratulations to the directors who did such an excellent job of organizing and directing this community project.

A pleasant breeze and slightly overcast skies made ideal weather conditions for the hundreds of spectators who were thrilled by the speed of the Jim Monaghan outboard which won the free-for-all. Mr. Monaghan is a native of Sydney and a member of the Charlottetown yacht club.

The cruiser class, new this year, was handily won by Dr. A. E. Ings. There were five entries in this class, four of which were built in Montague during the past winter, including the winner.

Another new class, boys' punt race, was won by Boyd Coffin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Coffin, who spends the summer months each year at their cottage in Brudenell. Another popular feature of the day for the younger generation was the swimming meet.

John W. Jamieson was in charge of the course, and Roy

Clow was the official starter. The most popular spot in the late afternoon was the supper table, where members of the Lower Montague Institute served over 700 meals.

During the afternoon, the amusement booths and canteens were well patronized, and many stayed on for an evening of dancing on the pier.

**Hospital Insurance Plan Explained By Dr. Prowse**

On Tuesday evening, July 7th the new Prince Edward Island Hospital Insurance plan was explained to the people in the O'Leary Public Hall, by Dr. Prowse of Charlottetown, which will only be compulsory for those residents of the province who fall into the classification of employee groups or collective groups the members of the other classification.

The pay direct groups can decide for themselves if they wish to take advantage of the plan. One reason for having the plan he pointed out was that hospital rates have increased because hospital care is improving.

The plan will go into operation October 1st, 1959, and is only open to residents of P. E. I. Those who join will be provided basic ward service. The rates will be \$2 monthly for a single person and \$4 a month for a married couple, which would provide protection for his entire family, except for children over nineteen years of age.
