N. E. and P. E. Island Methodist Conference.

(Special Correspondence of the Examiner.) Most of the city pulpits on Sabbath were occupied by members of the Conference. The day was fine—rather too warm—and the congregations were large.

FIFTH DAY.

After devotional exercises, a motion was passed that ex-President be relieved from giving the charge in the evening to the young men to be ordained, and that the Rev. Dr. Stewart be requested to deliver it.

Rev. D. D. Currie brought in the report of the Children's Fund, which was submitted and approved. Notes of thanks were accorded to several officers of the fund for their services.

The memorial committee presented their report respecting several sums of money left to the conference. Part of the report was accepted and part referred back for further consideration.

A memorial from P. E. Island district, asked that better provision be made for the comfort of lay men at the conference. It was recommended that hereafter the names of lay men appointed on conference committees be forwarded from each district to the ministers responsible for making provision for conference, and that their names and homes appear in the Wesleyan the same as ministers.

Dr. Stewart then gave the young men who were to be ordained in the evening, a thorough examination in which they acquitted themselves fairly well. The names of the young men are, Revs. H. Penna, T. Stebbings and T. Williams.

ORDINATION SERVICE

was held in Queen Square Church in the evening. The church was crowded. A strong choir rendered good service. The Service was under the direction of Rev. E. Evans. It was very solemn and impressive—a marked improvement upon last year.

SIXTH DAY.

After devotional exercises the thanks of the Conference were presented to Dr. Stewart for his ordination charge to the young men and he was requested to publish it in the Wesleyan. The Report of the Contingent Fund Committee was next received. It showed that \$312.95 had been received, and \$432 disbursed, still leaving a small balance in hand.

A motion was made by Rev. J. R. Naraway, A. M. for the re-admission of Rev. James Burns, without any claim upon the Conference Funds, and with the status of an unmarried man. An able discussion ensued, in which many of the members took part, but the motion was lost, 19 voting for it, and 45 against it.

TEMPERANCE MEETING

The speeches, though good, did not reach the level of the speeches given at the Missionary and Education Anniversaries. The meeting was closed by singing of the doxology and the benediction.
