THE TUPPER CLUB.

Able Addresses Delivered—Resolution of Sympathy.

The meeting of the Tupper Club last night was the largest yet held. In the unavoidable absence of the president, the vice-president, Dr. S. R. Jenkins, presided. After the routine business, Mr. Thomas A. McLean arose and in an appropriate address submitted the following resolution:—

Whereas: It has been the will of God to remove from earth our highly esteemed and much loved friend, Cyrus Shaw, Esq., M. L. A., we the members of the Tupper Club of Charlotte-town, do hereby record our deep sense of the loss sustained by the Liberal-Conservative Party of P. E. Island.

As a politician Mr. Shaw was honest and consistent in the advocacy of all measures calculated to advance the interest of this his native Isle. As an energetic worker in the party which he allied himself with he was persistent and watchful, always ready to defend the principles he advocated and believed in with all the reasoning powers with which he was highly gifted. As a watchman on the towers, the opposing party found him continually at his post, doing battle for what he believed to be right; as a citizen the community loses a warm-hearted, whole-souled, hospitable gentleman; as a husband and father, the bereaved wife and children, a loss that can never be made up. We trust however, that He who tempers the wind to the scorn lamb will look with compassion upon the widow and fatherless, whose loss is truly the greatest, and bring that comfort and consolation to their hearts that only comes to those who put their trust in Him who spake as never man spake.

Mr. D. O. M. Reddin seconded the motion, making a short and fitting address. The resolution was ably supported by Messrs. R. B. Norton, Dr. Macneill, Peter McCourt, C. Gavin Duffy, James McIsaac, Harrison Carvell and L. P. Tanton, who spoke in the order named and each of whom spoke feelingly of the deceased.

The motion was then unanimously adopted.

Mr. P. J. Trainor then addressed the meeting upon the questions of the day, speaking ably and eloquently, and paying a warm tribute to Mr. Shaw, whose death was mourned by all.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Trainor.

Meeting adjourned.
