

'64 Was Good Year For Canadian Ports

OTTAWA (CP) — Statistically one-tenth of one per cent to 226,549 from 266,324 while registered tonnage increased 61 per cent to 364,922,440 tons from 4,919,193.

Club Patrons Paying \$1.60 For Lemonade For Hostesses

OTTAWA (CP) — Lemonade If a patron asked what the glass was a bargain at \$1.60 a glass were drinking, they were sold it was a "fine wine."

That observation in effect was made Monday by Chief Justice Robert Taschereau as the Supreme Court of Canada dismissed a Crown appeal in the case of a Montreal night club where hostesses were served a lemonade drink called "semi-cokes" instead of alcohol.

Male patrons of the Black Orchid Club on St. Catherine Street West thought they were ordering alcoholic drinks for the hostesses and thus were being defrauded, Montreal Crown Attorney Bruno Patenaer contended.

Chief Justice Taschereau, told there is no cover charge to enter the club and that patrons also could dance with the hostesses if they wished, remarked: "That's cheap."

Night club owner Frank Colabro was charged with fraud by Montreal police for serving the lemonade drink.

The charge was tossed out by Mr. Justice Irenée Lagardie in April, 1964. The Montreal Court of Appeal upheld his ruling Feb. 5.

The Crown attorney Monday asked the Supreme Court for leave to appeal the Montreal decision.

He said hostesses at the Black Orchid had instructions from Colabro not only to urge male patrons to buy drinks for themselves but also to buy drinks for the hostesses.

The hostesses, he said, had strict instructions to order "semi-cokes" — a mixture of lemon, water and sugar.

Male patrons thought they were ordering alcoholic drinks for the hostesses and thus were being defrauded, the Crown attorney said.

RELIGION BILL PASSED

MANILA (AP) — A bill permitting religious instruction in public schools passed the Philippine House of Representatives Tuesday despite an angry demonstration outside by thousands of persons, most of them Protestants. The measure would permit teachers designated by clergy to teach religion in addition to their regular courses to students who desire it in the religion of the student's choice. Filipinos are predominantly Roman Catholic.
