Distinguished Officer To RCAF Station At S'side

One of the R.C.A.F.'s most distinguished officers, Air Vice Marshal J. L. Plante, C.B.E., A.F.C., will visit R.C.A.F. station, Summerside today. Recently returned from Europe, AVM Plante is air member for technical services at air force headquarters in Ottawa.

Until last July AVM Plante was chief of staff to the commander-in-chief of the Allied air forces in Central Europe, General L. Norstad. While filling the important position at the headquarters of the Allied air forces Central Europe, AVM Plante held the acting rank of Air Marshal. On return to Canada from France, he resumed his rank of Air Vice Marshal.

During his tour of duty in Europe, Group Captain Sweetman, D.S.O., D.F.C., served as staff officer to Air Vice Marshal Plante and accompanied him on several tours of European and African air bases.

Air Vice Marshal Plante is a native of Victoria, B.C. after obtaining a Bachelor of Science degree in mechanical engineering from the University of British Columbia, AVM Plante joined the R.C.A.F. in 1931.

Before the war, he filled a variety of flying, training and administrative positions and in 1939 was at air force headquarters, Montreal and at Western Air Command, Victoria. AVM Plante proceeded overseas early in 1942 to take command of No. 413 Coastal Command Squadron, leading the squadron to Ceylon for distinguished tour of duty. AVM Plante returned to the United Kingdom late in 1942 and commanded two RCAF stations in No. 6 Bomber Group. He was repatriated to Canada in December 1943 and appointed deputy air member for air staff (plans) at R.C.A.F. headquarters.

Later he commanded the R.C.A.F.'s No. 9 Transport Group until named air officer commanding Western Air Command, Vancouver. He remained in charge of the organization when its designation was changed to No. 12 Group. Late in 1947 AVM Plante was appointed air member for personnel at air force headquarters.

On August 15, 1951, AVM Plante assumed the post of assistant chief of staff for personnel and logistics at the headquarters of the Allied air forces Central Europe where he later became the chief of staff to the commander.
