

Dowling Scores In Final Minute To Give Abbies 7-6 Win Over Welshmen

Playing coach Cecil Dowling scored with little more than half a minute remaining in the game to give the Charlottetown Abbies a 7-6 victory over Prince of Wales College last night in a thrilling City Hockey League game at the Forum.

Willie Dunn started the play for Dowling's winning goal as he blocked a shot inside the Abbies blue line. He forwarded a pass to Jack Brown at centre ice and Brown carried over the Welshmen's line before putting Dowling in the clear.

Dowling picked the short side from about 15 feet out. The goal was a heartbreaker for the Abbies, terminated the Welshmen who battled their opponents down to the wire in the best City League game played here to date.

The Abbies held a 6-4 lead going into the third period but the Welshmen evened the count on quick goals by Ralph Whitehead and MacFadyen. Play saw-sawed back and forth for the remainder of the game until Dowling applied the clincher.

The Abbies built up a 4-2 lead in the first period. Each team scored twice in the middle session.

Dowling and Jack Brown each scored two goals for the winners. Harold Howatt and Willie Dunn were the other Abbie marksmen.

Ralph Whitehead sparked the Welshmen with a three goal performance. Gordon Tweedy scored twice and Malcolm MacFadyen accounted for the other P.W.C. goal.

The game developed into a rugged affair especially in the third period as the boys used their bodies freely.

Jack Spivey, fast skating Abbies defenseman, played a strong rushing game from his defense post. Once he hit the goal post on a blistering drive.

Welshmen were called upon to make a number of point blank saves in the third period as the two teams strove to get the winning goal.

Millionaires Protect Lead With 3-1 Victory Over Charlottetown Islanders

SYDNEY, (CP)—Sydney Millionaires protected their second-place holding in the Maritime Major Hockey League Tuesday night by downing the cellar-dwelling Charlottetown Islanders 3-1 before 950 fans.

The game was an hour late starting after the two clubs had battled icy roads for 13 hours from Charlottetown. Their play reflected the long haul; and the late start also slashed attendance.

Sydney won in the first period. Elliott "Specs" Chorley scored the first goal, and Claude Robert got it back for Islanders. Vince Palladino was sitting out a slashing penalty when George Robertson fired what proved to be the winning goal.

The other Sydney tally came late in the final frame when Islanders yanked goalie Roger Bessette in an attempt to tie it up. The strategy back-fired when Robert scored and Lorne Pirie came out of their own end with the puck, passed to playing coach Terry Reardon, who tucked it in the open net.

Play was well divided most of the way. Goalie Norm Defelice for Sydney had 31 saves, one less than Bessette. Both goalies came up with fine saves, although both clubs were erratic around the net. Only two minor penalties were called, one to each team.

S'ide Aces Stay On Top Of City Hockey League With 6-2 Win Over S.D.U.

The Summerside Aces stayed at the top of the City Hockey League by defeating St. Dunstan's University 6-2 at the Raceway Stadium last night, before about 700 fans in a rough game which featured twenty-five penalties, including six majors and one misconduct. Referees Moe Goodwin and Jimmie Razavet were sharp in their calling of infractions and this prevented the game from getting out of hand. The first period ended one-all and no penalties were called on either side. The condition of the ice made puck carrying difficult, but the play kept up at a fast tempo. Thirteen penalties were called in the sand-

HALIFAX, (CP)—Halifax Atlantics, always strong on home ice, whipped third-place Glace Bay Miners 7-3 Tuesday night in a Maritime Major Hockey League game delayed more than an hour by travelling conditions.

The win left Atlantics four points ahead of Sydney, who defeated Charlottetown Islanders 3-2 in the other league game.

Toronto Couple Wins Pairs Skating Title

OSLO, Norway, (CP)—Two young Torontonians won the world pairs figure-skating championship for Canada Tuesday night.

Frances Dafoe, 24, and Norris Bowden, 22, piled up a total of 11,014 points with 9.5 placements to finish far ahead of couples from Switzerland and Austria.

The Swiss team of Silvia and Michael Grandjean was second with 10,643 points and a placement total of 17.5. Third were Sissy Schwartz and Kurt Oppel of Austria with 10,486 points, 21 placements.

The Canadians' performance was skated to combinations of music,

including from dances to serious classics. Besides conventional movements they sprung some new ones on judges. Their most spectacular new invention with a lift where Bowden tossed Miss Dafoe up to sitting position on his right shoulder then let her slide head-long down to land on ice in a mad spin.

Miss Dafoe and Bowden both from the Toronto Skating Club were Canadian and North American pair champions in 1953 as well as Canadian waits and ten-step champions for the second straight year. The same year they
