WHY PREPARING ?

If we are to believe our advisers, the secret of Great Britain's warlike preparations lies in the fact that she has been provoked by the intrigues of Russian and French and Turkish diplomatists to take full possession of Egypt. It will have been noted that the Egyptian flag alone was hoisted over Fashoda. Taking advantage of this admission, and by virtue of his right as Suzerain of Egypt, which theoretically is merely one of the provinces of the Ottoman Empire, the Sultan has granted the lease of the Bahr-el-Ghazal to France. We are told that it is knowledge of this that is precipitating the action of the British Government in proclaiming an English protectorate. Russia's hand has been discovered in the matter. Count Muravieff visited Paris recently at the express command of the Czar. It has leaked out that while there he informed M. Deicasse and President Faure that if France declared war against England now she would have to fight her alone. But he promised on the part of the Czar that if France would have patience and defer any quarrel that she might have to pick with England to a more favorable opportunity, Russia would take steps to bring the entire question of England's presence in Egypt and its illegality before a European congress, and would support France to the last extremity in her contention. It is stated that in view of these circumstances, the Government of Great Britain has decided to bring the matter to an issue at once by formally declaring a Protectorate over Egypt. By this act she will wrest from the Sultan his suzerainty and challenge the pretensions of France in such a way as may provoke war. This, it is said, is why she is preparing.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It is wonderful that farmers and others will keep considerable amounts of money locked up in their houses in wooden drawers and tin boxes at the risk of loss by fire and theft when there is a savings bank in every town and almost every village.

—Speaking of the recent bye election in South Orleans, the Montreal Gazette says: "Desperate" is the word usually used to describe a government's effort to hold a seat on which its fate may depend. There was not much left undone by Mr. Hardy's friends in South Ontario.

—Mr. Chamberlain has instituted an enquiry as to the rights of Mr. Menier in the Island of Anticosti. It appears that this French gentleman purchased the fee simple of the island, and has been acting lately as though he were, within its limits, a despotic little king. He has yet to learn that he is subject to the laws of the Province of Quebec and Canada at large.

—Mr. Tarte has declared that the Government will spend more next year than it is spending this year. No doubt the economical farmers and taxpayers of Canada (and of this Province in particular) will have made a note of the fact. They voted the Tories out because the Liberals promised to reduce the public expenditures by \$3,000,000 or \$4,000,000 a year. But last year the expenditures amounted to \$44,240,117 and this year's estimates of expenditure amount to \$47,970,948. If this sum should be exceeded next year the deluded taxpayers will be thinking about making another change.
