The supper-hour in the church hall was followed immediately by a round table forum led by the Rev. W. B. F. Corkum at which plans were finalized for a teachers and leaders forum to be held in Souris United Church.

Worship at the evening meeting was conducted by the teachers and children of St. Peter's Bay charge and included the charming singing of the junior surplined choir. The Rev. Donald MacClare of Kingsboro spoke most effectively on the work of the M. E. C. following which the Rev. W. B. F. Corkum sang "Fairest Lord Jesus." Mrs. Gordon MacDonald with a very timely film strip on the story of the Bible brought information and inspiration to all.

Yugoslavia Opposed To Spain As Unesco Member

PARIS, Nov. 17 — (Reuters) — Marshal Tito's Communist Yugoslavia today opposed an application from Generalissimo Franco's totalitarian Spain from membership in UNESCO.

Yugoslav delegate Vladislav Ribnik said nations which cannot guarantee Unesco's principles of peace, liberty and democratic collaboration should not be permitted to join.

Ribnik addressed 500 delegates at the seventh annual conference of Unesco — the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

The question of admission of new members is expected to be discussed at the end of the general debate — probably tomorrow.

But in spite of protests Spain is expected to gain the two-thirds majority needed for her admission. Britain and the United States, as well as most of the Latin American and Commonwealth countries, will support her application it is expected.

Although excluded from the United Nations, Spain has joined certain technical UN organs, including the Food and Agriculture Organization and the World Health Organization.

Mexico and Uruguay have led the behind-scenes battle against Spain's admission to Unesco.

The Spanish Government delivered a letter today to Unesco declaring it would guarantee the free circulation in Spain of all the UN body's publications.

Unesco tonight issued a "three-page list of protests against Spain's admission" from such international, confederation of free Trade Unions, the Socialist International, and groups from some Latin American countries.

TORONTO, Nov. 17—(CP)—Jester's Standard Dreamer, veteran prize-winning Jersey bull owned by Edison B. Mutch of North River, P.E.I., today was awarded the grand champion title at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair.

Mr. Mutch's animal won the event against eight other former prize winners never before in competition together. The contest was nicknamed by breeders "The Battle of the Bulls".

Reserve ribbon went to Pine-tree Spotlight Model, 1951 grand champion at the Canadian National Exhibition, owned by J. Lionel Dion, East Farnham, Que.

Jester's Standard Dreamer, grand champion at the Charlottetown Fair from 1949-52 and took the same title at the Maritime Winter Fair in 1948, 49 and 51. His dam was grand champion at Charlottetown and the Maritime Winter Fair in 1949.

Another Maritime entry in the event, Silver Fern's Gem, owned by The Harvey Jersey Club, Harvey Station, N. B., placed fourth. Reserve junior champion at the All-American Jersey Show and Maritime Winter Fair in 1949, the animal was purchased by the Harvey Club at the Sale of Star, Columbus, O., in 1949.

James Bremner, secretary of the Canadian Jersey Breeders Club, said the competition was the strongest ever seen in a show ring in Canada.
