Claims Few In Queen's Co. Will Benefit From Budget

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—(Special)—Only about 240 of the 25,000 people in Queen's County will benefit from Finance Minister Abbott's budget tax-cuts, the House of Commons was told last night by J. Angus MacLean, Progressive Conservative member for Queen's.

Mr. MacLean was sceptical about the Government's claims to have reduced the national debt. This debt was reduced, he said, not so much by government action as by paying off government obligations with inflated dollars.

"The people who really reduced Canada's debt," he said, "were those who bought victory bonds during their savings during the war years. Measured by the value of the Canadian dollar today, these bondholders are just getting back half of what they paid 10 years ago. They are getting back half the purchasing power that they put into these bonds."

This situation of the drop in the real value of government bonds had worked a severe hardship on many people, he said. Uncontrolled inflation permitted by the government had hit those on fixed incomes very severely. In the fixed income class, he placed persons living on interest from bonds, on pensions of all types and on proceeds of insurance policies.

In the field of corporation tax, the Queen's member charged there had been unfair discrimination against privately-owned power companies. Consumers of electric power in Prince Edward Island are penalized in this corporation tax whereas consumers of electricity in some of the other provinces such as Ontario are better off since publicly-owned electric power establishments are not subject to federal corporations tax. This tax on the operations of privately-owned electric power companies was a factor which is retarding the growth of rural electrification in Prince Edward Island he told the Commons.

Mr. MacLean complained that there had been no reduction in the 1953 budget. He added that the only way to give true tax relief to farmers and to persons in the lower income brackets was by a cut in sales tax. He branded as "very unfair" the refusal of the Finance Minister of exempt heavy equipment purchased by Canadian municipalities from sales tax. It was "discrimination beyond understanding," he said, not to accord cities at least as favorable treatment in heavy equipment purchases, as that given the provinces. The Queen's member said he was pleased over the abolition of the radio license fee and over the cancellation of the stamp tax on cheques.

Emphasizes Heavy Toll Of Accidents At First Aid Meeting

"Over 40 per cent of the deaths in Canada between the ages of one to nine years are caused by accidents," said Dr. O. W. Curtis, deputy minister of Health and Welfare in addressing the Red Cross First Aid instructors at the week-end Refresher Course now in progress. The importance of "Accident Prevention" which is the main purpose of any first aid programme was the subject of the discussion led by Dr. Curtis. Mrs. Curtis stated that a good example was one of the best methods of instructing the young along these lines.

Others who took the lead in different phases of the course yesterday were Mrs. N. D. MacLean, triangular bandages, Hugh Simpson, Dr. River, the Misses Baker, A. J. Murchison, the first aid treatment of spinal injuries, Mr. William McPhee, Supervisor of Teacher Training at P.W.C. on the fundamentals of teaching, and Messrs. John Mullally and Paul MacLean, first aid to the injured and the new Holger-Neilson method of artificial respiration respectively.

Today's sessions will be given by Sr. Mary Irene on the splinting of fractures, Dr. R. D. MacNeill on first aid in civil defence and Mrs. Murray Humber, director of the Red Cross First Aid Department.

The chairman called on Mr. Woodrow Wheatley to tell of what could be done to remedy the meat situation as all present felt inspection was necessary. Mr. Wheatley said that he was at present a member of a committee appointed to investigate a killing plant for this area. He stated that if their plans were successful the new plant could supply meat inspection to the city.

Those present last night heard three inspectors from the Federal Department of Agriculture describe the methods of grading products sold and explained in detail what the women as consumers should look for when they enter a store. Mr. William MacLeod, in charge of the Fruit and Vegetable Division, told of past efforts to obtain better grading and how finally a compulsory system was going into effect March 1.

Farm Workers Due From Netherlands

Seven Dutch farm workers are due to arrive in the Province in the next few days. It is expected that the immigrants will disembark at Halifax over the week-end.

Two of the seven are married and will bring their wives with them. The Dutch workers will be employed with various farmers throughout the province.

It is expected that more Dutch workers will be arriving in the province from time to time. All of them are brought here by previous arrangements and to fill orders placed by farmers in advance.

The National Employment Office in Charlottetown now maintains a Card Index of all new Canadians of whom they have records. This list is corrected from time to time, and is made available on request to any church or welfare organization which may have need of it.

Besides the considerable number of Dutch people resident in the Province, there are more than thirty German nationals, some of whom have brought their families to the Island. Quite a few Dutch settlers are acquiring farms, and in most cases are having considerable success.

During the next few months the flow of Dutch farm help will slacken but German workers, according to the Local Employment Office, will be available in increasing numbers.

Meeting of Guernsey Breeders Yesterday

"I was greatly impressed with the development of the Guernsey herds I was privileged to see in Ontario," said Mr. Guy Rodd in a brief report to the special meeting of the Island Guernsey Breeders Association held in the Board Room of the Department of Agriculture yesterday afternoon.

"After visiting 10 outstanding farms," Mr. Rodd said, "it became strikingly clear that our friends in Ontario are building bigger cows, of a strong, heavy and vigorous type, well adapted to the detail and touched briefly on advanced registration requirements. The policy in this respect," concluded Mr. Rodd, "will be continued very much as at present until an improved matter for regret with me, that our smaller breeders are working under difficulties in this respect." Mr. Rodd was provincial delegate to the Guernsey Breeders National meeting held recently in Toronto.

The Island Association bonus policy was the subject of considerable discussion, resulting in the following resolution, moved by Mr. Rodd and seconded by Mr. Harold Palmer: "To qualify for the Association bonus, the animal must be from a dam qualified in R.O.P. A two year old is eligible if she is qualified herself, whether her dam is qualified or not. A calf from a two year old heifer is eligible if her maternal grand-dam is qualified. The purchaser must be more than four females, including the animal he is buying."

It was moved by Mr. Harold Laird, seconded by Harold Palmer that inspection be made by a qualified man and that Mr. L. W. Roper be asked to perform this service.

Mr. Tyrus Holmes moved a resolution, seconded by Mr. Harrison Green that a grant of \$5.00 per Guernsey member be given to Call Clubs as a gesture of good-will to these organizations. It was moved by Mr. Rodd, seconded by Harold Laird, that a committee consisting of Messrs. Willard Proude, Neil Matheson and Eric Hurry be authorized to discuss the bonus policy with Provincial Department of Agriculture officials.
