Ch'town's Irish Society Pays Tribute To Patron Saint

Hundreds of Charlottetown's Irish paraded yesterday - St. Patrick's Day - in paying annual homage to patron saint of Ireland. The parade, held under clear skies and in brisk cool weather, was one of the most successful and largely attended in years. Members of the Benevolent Irish Society, under the command of chief marshal Ray Dunn and assistant chief marshals Wilfred Smith and Preston Curley, assembled for the parade in front of the Whelan Building on Grafton Street. It moved off at 9.30 for the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer where Solemn High Mass

was celebrated by Very Rev. C. H. Moreau, C.SsR, with Rev. E. Demarah, C.SsR, as deacon and Rev. John Keough, C.SsR, as sub-deacon. The sermon was delivered by Father Demarah. **PLACE WREATHS** Prior to arriving at the church the parade stopped at the cenotaph on Grafton Street where wreaths were placed by two war veteran members of the society Ambrose Smith and Chester Donovan. Last Post and Reveille were sounded by bugler David Mills. Following the church service the parade returned to the Whelan Building via Upper

Queen, Euston, Great George and Grafton where it disbanded. Standard bearers were Joseph Thistle and Leo Dowling. The parade was accompanied by the Prince Edward Island Regiment band which provided stirring Irish airs. The band was under the direction of Lieutenant Charles MacGregor. Following the parade a social period was held in the club rooms where remarks were made by the society's president Everett B. Beagan and other members of the executive. The big day of the Irish was brought to a successful conclusion last night with the second presentation of "Laughing Irish Eyes" at the Birchwood High School Auditorium. The play under the direction of J. Pius Callaghan, C.D.A., was sponsored by the BIS and played to another capacity audience.

(Continued from page 1) plan but not necessarily the services. Dr. Bonnell: "If you want a sales tax, then say so—that is the only way in which you can guarantee what you are proposing." R. R. Bell: "Nova Scotia is paying for it out of general revenue." Premier Matheson: "Why don't you tell the people the right story. Nova Scotia is paying for it through general revenue by the imposition of a sales tax." Mr. Bell: "I said they were paying for it out of general revenue and I'm sticking to it." Premier: "That's the trouble with you, you have stuck with something that is not right for too many years. That is why you are on that side of the House instead of this one. You said in your radio speech Saturday night that conditions at Riverside were deplorable. Why don't you read the report that came into this House today. Is that what it says?" Mr. Bell: "I gave the grand jury report of 1958." Premier: "Today's report is the highest in the land." The report to which the Premier was referring was that of the Select Standing Committee on Public Buildings which was highly complimentary to the gov-

ernment and appears elsewhere in this issue. **DEBATE HEATS UP** Premier: "The speech you gave Saturday night was one of the grandest pieces of misrepresentation ever perpetrated in this province. You wouldn't dare give it in this House because you would never get away with your cock and bull stories." Mr. Bell: "Just like you didn't like the grand jury's report and you were over to the court house the next day to find out who was on the jury. You can bluff as much as you like." Premier: "The Honorable member from O'Leary has quoted from Dr. Taylor: I guarantee that this act is in the best interests of the people of Prince Edward Island. Dr. Taylor has been my advisor and the advisor of the minister and the Hospital Committee and it is on his advice that we are introducing this plan." Dr. Dewar: "You haven't that in writing." Premier: "You have it in writing. You have his talk while he was in this House. It has been recorded and I will get you a transcript of it." **EASIEST WAY** Premier: "The Premier went on to say that a sales tax would be the 'easiest way in the world' to raise the money for the Insurance plan. 'But I feel that I would be unfair to the trust that the electors of this province put in me if I were to introduce it. I'm not looking out for the next election, I'm looking out for the people of this province and that is more than the Opposition is. They are getting worried about the election.' Mr. Bell: 'I beat you in 1943.' Premier: 'That's right, you did beat me in 1943, but I learned a lot in the way you did it.' **BIG REASON** Premier Matheson said there was another reason why he wanted to plan to go through as it was. He observed that it was the same plan as that of Ontario and if it could be made to operate in Prince Edward Island, it would be one of the strongest arguments the province could use in improving its fiscal relations at Ottawa. 'By using this as a lever, I can prove to Ottawa that we are entitled to the same per capita grants as Ontario which would have the effect of doubling the province's payment. It will be the most important thing that has happened to the province since 1873,' the Premier declared. Leo Rossiter stated that payroll deductions were mandatory in Ontario. He said over 60 per cent of the people fell into this category. **COULD BE MANDATORY** The Premier said payroll deductions could become mandatory on the Island. Mr. Rossiter: "Is it going to be done?" Premier: "It's up to the Commission." Mr. Rossiter: "If its voluntary its voluntary and if its mandatory its mandatory. That's as plain as ABC. But which is it? Premier: "It is a voluntary plan,

exactly the same as in Ontario." Mr. Bell: "Is it not voluntary?" Mr. Rossiter: "Are you trying to throw a smoke screen around it?" **NO AGREEMENT YET** Premier: "We haven't a clear cut agreement with Ottawa as yet." Mr. Rossiter: "You went to Ottawa two years ago and came back and told us we were going to have hospital insurance. Why are you copying Ontario's act and making changes in the dying moments of the House?" Premier Matheson said he was in no way ashamed of copying Ontario's act. He explained that the first steps taken were to appoint a citizen's committee then a hospital insurance interim committee. He said this latter report was not submitted to the government until last summer. He asserted that the act was the same as Ontario's and if the federal government had seen fit to enter into an agreement with the larger province there was no reason why they should hesitate to do so for PEI. **CAREFUL GOING OVER** Mr. Matheson said the bill had been carefully scrutinized by himself and by as many as could give expert advice on the matter. He reported that two federal men were in the province look-
