SEAMEN'S MOVEMENTS.—The Island steamers did good work yesterday, notwithstanding the high winds prevailing. The steamer from Pictou reached here about half-past seven, and the one from Point DuChene was but a few minutes late in reaching Summerside. The foreign mail arrived in the city about twenty minutes to nine.

A LIVELY OLD MAN.—The Shelburne, N. S. Budget says: John Lyons, Sherouse Island, Barrington, spent last week with his friends at this place. Mr. Lyons, who is 78 years of age, walked from his home on the Island to the residence of his sister, Mrs. Crowell, at Lower Wood's harbor, in two hours and a quarter. The distance is about eight miles.

A BIG OFFER REFUSED.—W. J. Nelson, of Bridgewater, N. S., states that he has refused to accept an offer of \$100,000 for the right of W. J. Nelson & Co. to have to manufacture Minard's Liniment in the United States. The offer was made some days ago by an English syndicate now operating in the States. The right to manufacture the liniment in Canada is held by C. C. Richards & Co. of Yarmouth.

WESLEY'S CENTENARY.—The Methodists of England are preparing to celebrate to celebrate the centenary of the death of Wesley in March, and to build over his grave a tomb. It is proposed to substitute seven handsome marble pillars for the present wooden pillars under the gallery, each to cost \$500. The Methodist Church of Canada has been invited to contribute funds for one of these, and the Methodist Episcopal churches of the United States one each.

TORONTO'S CIVIC TROUBLES.—The civic debt of Toronto is \$75 per head of the population. Toronto has evidently been leading a fast life. Her net debt is \$12,775,000, upon which the average family of five persons has to pay \$17.50 a year in interest. She has spent \$3,370,783 of borrowed money on water works construction since 1864, and now she has a water famine. Her sewers are miserable and her streets are muddy.

THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN PICTOU.—The Mayor and City Council of Pictou presented His Excellency the Governor-General with an address on the occasion of his return to that place from Charlottetown on Saturday. Previous to the presentation of the address His Excellency and party were treated to a drive around the city and suburbs, visiting the Academy and Logan's Tannery during the course of the afternoon. The vice-royal party remained in Pictou over Sunday, attending service in St. James Church, and left for Montreal via Truro on Monday.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 28. Mr. Webster, immigration agent, has assurance that four hundred Canadian families settled in Dakota will remove to Manitoba next spring.

Manitoba dairymen are asking the Government to raise the duty on butter to enable them to secure the British Columbia market.

Bishop Macdonald, of Alexandria, was consecrated to-day at that place, Archbishop Cleary officiating. There was a large attendance of bishops, priests and laity. An address was presented to the new bishop by the Protestants of the district and a banquet was given in the evening.

The "Colonel" Heard From. WOODSTOCK, Ont., Oct. 28.

The latest sensation in the Birchall case is a letter dated October 5, addressed to the prisoner, and supposed to be written by a person in Jackson, Michigan, and signed by the "Colonel," a signature that has figured very conspicuously in the case in connection with the prosecution. The writer tells the whole story how he killed Benwell. The whole thing is no doubt a "fake," and looks more as if it was written or dictated by the prisoner than any person. The writer is supposed to have been in Birchall's confidence during the whole plot. He addresses him very familiarly as "Rex, my dear," &c., and tells him he has been watching him since the eventful 17th of February.

They Want \$5,000. OTTAWA, Oct. 28. The Vacuum Oil Company, of Rochester, N. Y., commenced an action in the Exchequer Court to recover \$5,000 deposited with the Collector of Customs at Montreal two years ago, on the occasion of the seizure of some of the company's goods, such seizure being subsequently shown to be unfounded.

The Gunboats All Right. LISBON, Oct. 28. Advice has been received from Mozambique to the effect that the British gunboats Mosquito and Herald have safely ascended the Shire and entered the Ruo River.

Letter of recall have been sent to Senor Freitas, Portuguese minister, to England.

Other wreckage that came ashore there include a tool chest, a wicker fruit basket, some plank and spool-wood. The spool-wood is in bundles and marked in stencil, "Carbray." Lots of plank, logs and other wooden cargo came ashore between Darnley and French River. The correspondent thinks the indications point to some Norwegian or Danish vessel a total wreck. He also describes a piece of wood found bearing on one side the word "Falka," and on the other "Greenock."—St. John Telegraph.

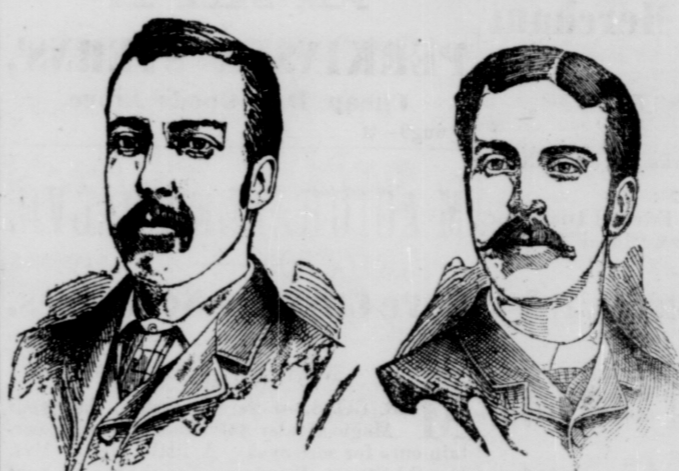
