**DEADLOCK IN DAIRY PRODUCE.**  
(Montreal Star, Friday)

Negotiations at the country boards yesterday did nothing towards bridging over the gulf between buyers and sellers. At Brockville, the offerings were 2069 colored and 1096 white. For both descriptions \$1c was the highest bid during the session, and this of course failed to induce any of the salesmen to let go. The auctioneer made a short address up in the folly of the deadlock in general, and this one in particular, and urged a little yielding on both sides. As a result, perhaps, a few sales were effected at 9 1/2c after adjournment. For August the factory men are generally wanting 9 1/2c, and for the balance of the season 9c. At Barrie, 2035, mostly first half of September; 495 were sold at 9c, but the balance were unsold. At Listowel, offerings aggregated 9057 boxes, of which about 2000 boxes were last half of August make and the balance September. Business was confined to the August at 9 1/2 to 9 3/4c. Of the situation in New York city the Journal of Commerce and Commercial Bulletin says: "The market for large full cream cheese is at a complete standstill today, while supplies are not especially heavy; still, nearly all receivers have more or less stock for sale. There is scarcely any demand from exporters or home trade buyers and prices are merely nominal. Small size full cream are having fair demand from the home trade, but not to the extent of the offerings, though the tone is fairly steady for strictly fancy grades. Part skins have sold very slowly so far this week, and prices, while held about as before, show rather an easy tone."

For the finest creamery there is some demand this morning, but as they are in no case willing to bid over 19 1/2c, business in a wholesale way is inclined to drag. In New York the market for choice and fancy fresh creamery is steady at 21 to 22c. The steamers that sailed from there for London and Liverpool on Wednesday took out 4953 packages, but this was nearly all of the butter that shippers there have owned for some time.

The new ship has tonnage of 9750, is 300 feet long and 79 feet wide. She will be fitted with an exceptionally powerful armament.
