DEATH TO THE JEWS

Notorious Jew Hater Stirs up Trou-
ble in Algiers.

ALGIERS, Sept. 21.—Max Regis (former mayor of Algiers) a notorious Jew hater, who returned here recently, haunted by the idea that the government intended to arrest him and envious of the notoriety of Jules Guerin, shut himself up for four days with a party of adherents in a villa, labelled "Anti-Juf," just outside the town. He laid in a stock of provisions for a siege. Yesterday, apparently annoyed at the absence of any move on the part of the police, he issued forth and entered the town, stirring up an anti-Jewish demonstration, during which the windows of several shops were smashed.

The Jews responded by firing revolvers and the mob raised the cry "Death to the Jews."

The riots continued throughout the evening and finally the troops charged with drawn swords and dispersed the rioters.

DREYFUS PREMATURELY AGED.

He is Like a Dead Man Returning to
the World.

LONDON, September 22.—A correspondent of the Daily Mail who joined the Dreyfus party at Bordeaux and accompanied it to Carpentras, describes Dreyfus as "thoughtful, prematurely aged, with soft eyes, a smile like a woman, and rather the appearance of a servant than a soldier." When told of the great wave of British sympathy in his behalf, he wrung the correspondent's hand and showed the deepest emotion. His health, the correspondent says, is far from satisfactory. He ate meat yesterday for the first time. "It is against the doctors orders" said Mathieu Dreyfus, "Ah," said the former captain of artillery, "let me have a holiday today. I will be sedate and obedient again tomorrow (I am like a boy just now, and I feel that I could run and jump about the green fields for very joy. Just think, I shall now be able to laugh and play with my children in the beautiful country."

After the meal, despite his brother's half laughing protest, he smoked several cigars, "to celebrate the holiday." The sad note amid the rejoicings was the death of M. Sheurer-Kestner.

"I am grieved beyond words," said Dreyfus, "To think that I shall never be able to thank that noble heart." One of his first acts on obtaining his freedom was to have a wreath sent to be placed on the coffin of his champion and friend.

At present he speaks little of past events. He says: "I have forgiven, but cannot forget; and he intends to devote himself to proving his innocence. When that has been accomplished, he will only ask to be allowed to spend the remainder of his days with his loved ones, far from the busy world."

"His delight at everything on the journey," continues the Daily Mail's correspondent, "was that of a man returning from the dead to the world he loved. The affection and solicitude of his brother are touching to see. His physical weakness causes the deepest apprehension to his friends. The journey was in the main uneventful, except for a few expressions of disappointment on the part of the people who wanted a sensation."

NEWS FROM THE TRANSVAAL

Joubert Has Offers of
Assistance.

KRUGER CONFERRING WITH
PRESIDENT STEYN.

Decision of the Raad Awaited With
Much Interest.

PRETORIA, Sept. 23.—Kruger has been in telegraphic conference with President Steyn regarding the situation, and the decision of the Raad of the Orange Free State is awaited with interest.

Large numbers of local Germans, Frenchmen, Hollanders and Americans have offered their services to Commandant General Joubert in the event of hostilities.

The elder burghers still fail to see grounds of a casus belli, but if Mr. Chamberlain makes what they would characterize as "humiliating demands," such as for instance, disarmament, war would be inevitable.

CAPE TOWN, Sept. 23.—It is understood here that the secret session of the Raad of the Orange Free State will continue until the beginning of next week.

Fighting Together

PARIS, Sept. 21.—The government of Dahomey cables that the Franco-German commission which is deciding the Togoland boundary is being resisted by natives. The commission had to fight several engagements, defeating the natives and inflicting considerable loss upon them, while losing only one native trooper. The French and Germans co-operated with the greatest cordiality, under command of the French commissioner.

Heaviest Fighting on Natal Border.

PRETORIA, Sept. 21.—General Joubert, the Boer commander-in-chief, is quoted as saying in an interview:—"The situation is serious. Probably the heaviest fighting will occur on the Natal border. The British are likely to attempt to invade the Transvaal by way of Van Reenan's Pass."
