FARM FORUM

A strong committee will be appointed by the Executive of Farm Radjo Forum to study the position of a study group program which has been in operation for sixteen years. The Committee will report at the Annual Conference to be held in June. The decision was made by the Semi-Annual Meeting of the National Board in recognition of the fact that many changes have taken place in Canadian farm life in five years; that rural attitudes and ideas on education have changed; and that Farm Forum may require a number of important changes in order to make it satisfactory and interesting to farm people at present and in the immediate future.

SURPLUS DISPOSAL

One of agriculture's basic problems is how to deal with farm products that from time to time are produced in amounts exceeding what the market will take without forcing prices down to depressed levels. For the world as a whole the real and urgent need is for more food production. Yet the insecurity of depressed prices is one of the major causes of the most advanced countries to feel very great concern. For most countries of the world it is a matter of national policy not to allow agricultural production to decline. Most imports are

AMONG THE FARMERS

Federation of Agriculture Newsletter

C. F. A. ANNUAL MEETING - Occupying an important place in the discussions at the Canadian Federation of Agriculture Annual Meeting at Hamilton will, of course, be the troublesome questions of surplus production and the relationship between farm costs and farm returns.

From the Atlantic to the Pacific the farmer is feeling the squeeze, one which has some appearance of not being over in a hurry. This is not a problem over which the individual farmer can exercise much influence. Change will require the intervention of the Federal Government and the understanding of the importance of not allowing agriculture to become a third rate industry.

Because of the determination of most countries to protect their agriculture, food exporters cannot, by increasing production and reducing prices, expect to capture large markets in other countries that formerly went to producers in those countries. Such efforts will only meet with resistance in the form of increased trade barriers of various sorts. Such competitive efforts will hurt exporters, but will do little to increase export markets.

It is important not to confuse problems of orderly marketing with problems of surplus disposal. In the case of Canada's major agricultural exports—wheat and other grain—production in Canada and in the world varies greatly from year to year because of the weather. Fortunately, grain is storable for long periods.

If the situation is looked at from the point of view of these long periods it is at least doubtful if there has often been a serious world grain surplus. The answer to apparent surpluses is to market grain in an orderly way, over a period of years. If this is done it may very well be possible to avoid shortages and high scarcity prices to the consumer, and at the same time eliminate periods of excessively low prices to the producer. The

NEW PAVEMENT (Streets)

A total of 4,682 lineal feet of new City asphalt pavement, covering an area of 125,783.25 square feet, was laid during the year 1955. Following is a breakdown of streets laid of 4 in. black base and 1 in. surface of asphaltic mortar:

Princo Street 2737.7 Sq. Ft., Fitzroy Street 8627.7, Euston Street 473.75, Kent Street 2263, Water Street 708, Princo Street 2121.6, Grafton Street 943.5, Gt. George Street 222, School Street 2450, Grafton Street 1814.5, Corner of Longworth Ave. and Euston 1448.

Resurfacing of sidewalks with 1 in. asphalt was carried out on Queen Street 3,024 sq. ft., Grafton Street 200, Queen Street 2450, Grafton Street 1814.5, Corner of Longworth Ave. and Euston 1448.

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The pavement laid on Elm Ave. by the Warren Paving Co. (Maritime times Ltd.) in the year 1952 was found to be worn and deteriorated so much so, quite large areas of the original old pavement were exposed.

In the latter part of the year, they undertook to resurface Elm Ave. from City Limits to just East of Chestnut Street.

A keyway was cut into the existing pavement 2 1/2 ft. from the curb on each side of the street, and a new surface of 1 in. thickness of stone-filled asphaltic top was laid. This was done without charge by the Warren Paving Co. as per their original agreement.

CHIP SEAL STREETS All streets that had previously received a coat of chip seal were re-chip sealed, plus a few additional streets were added. The work of chip sealing was carried out by the Island Construction Co. Chip seal was applied to the following streets: Admiral's Street, Ailey Street, Ambrose Street, Birchwood Street, Bishop Street, Brighton Ave., Chestnut Street, Crestwood Drive, Douglas Street, Spring Park Road, Sydney Street, Union Street, Upper Queen Street, Greenfield Ave., Hensley Street, Hillcrest Ave., Highland Ave., King Street, Maple Street, McGill Terrace, Orlebar Street, Park Terrace, Passmore Street, Pleasant Street, Spring Park Road, Villa Street, Victoria Street, Victory Ave. Total length Re-Chip-sealing, 21,850 Lin. Ft.

In addition to the above streets re-chipsealed, the following street received a coat of chip seal: Goodwill Avenue Sidmount Avenue York Island Cross Roads Victoria Park -- Total Length, 4350 Lin. Ft.

Work was done on Passmore Street, John Street, Gerald and Laphorne Ave., Lower Water, Conroy, Pleasant, Valley Street, Upper Queen St., Douglas Street, Park Street, Upper Queen Street and Connolly requiring 1,640 ft. 15 in. Pipe, 301 ft. 12 in pipe, 223 ft. 2 in pipe, 23 catch Basins 16 ft., 2 ft. Steel Culvert and 40 ft. 4 ft. Steel Culvert.

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Street Department Reports One Of Busiest Years Ever

Councillor P. R. McCormac, chairman of the Street Committee, reported that the year 1955 was one of the busiest the department has had. This was due to the extra celebration had created, in addition to the paving programme, tree trimming and removal and snow removal.

The report also showed that the expenditures for street maintenance was \$161,010.76, and the capital expenditures had amounted to \$143,829.87.

The paving programme included Chestnut Street (Upper Queen to Elm Ave.), Douglas Street (Upper Queen to Spring Park Rd.), Spring Park Road (at intersection at Douglas), Esher Street (Euston to Longworth Ave.), Laphorne Avenue (Longworth Ave. west 669 feet) and Gerald Street (from School 562.3 feet east). All work was carried out under the direction of the City Engineer.

In addition to the general repairs and maintenance of concrete sidewalks in various sections of the city, new walks were laid on the east side of Windsor Street and on the south-east corner of Douglas and Spring Park Road. Considerable work was done in the laying of new storm sewers and catch basins.

All streets that had previously been chip sealed received a new coating, and several streets were given an initial coating. Clay and gravel streets were further built up, in preparation of future paving.

Early in the year a new flusher was purchased from the Bickle Seagrave Co., and the old flusher was overhauled and kept in reserve for emergencies. Two new steel body dump trucks were purchased from W. G. Barbour Ltd., and the old trucks were replaced.

The patching of streets and the laying of new pavement was started early in the year. Altogether a total of 184,903.05 square feet of asphalt was laid in street paving, sidewalks. In addition, 290 lineal feet of streets were coated with chipseal.

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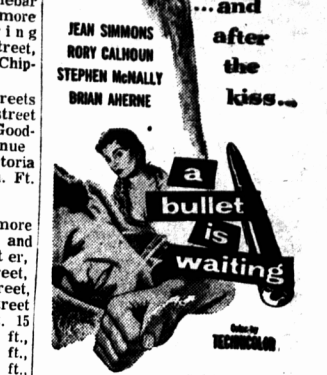
