On motion, His Excellency the Lieut. Governor left the Chair and the High Sheriff, Francis Longworth, Esq., having been called thereto—

It was moved by Hon. C. Hensley, seconded by Judge Peters—

That the thanks of the meeting are justly due to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor for the able and impartial manner in which he presided over the business of the meeting.

This resolution was conveyed to His Excellency by the High Sheriff, who, in courteous terms acknowledged the same.

A Subscription List, headed as follows, was then laid on the Table:

We the undersigned do hereby bind ourselves to pay into the hands of the Treasurer of the Agricultural Society now proposed to be formed, in Charlottetown, or to the Treasurer of the "Royal Agricultural Society" of Prince Edward Island, provided it shall be incorporated, and accept a Constitution on the principles, and under the regulations contained in the annexed Resolutions, the several sums set against our names, annually, for the term of three years, on condition that the Legislature during that time, make an Annual appropriation to the Society of a sum equal to the aggregate of the amount so subscribed and paid.

MEETING AT ST. ELEANOR'S.

At the Annual Meeting of the St. Eleanor's Agricultural Society, held on the 8th January, 1849, the Rev. Dr. Wiggins, President, in the Chair, after the business of the Society had been disposed of, the following Resolutions were adopted:

Moved by Thomas Hunt, Esq.—1. Resolved, That this Society has been long impressed with the necessity of introducing a better system of Agriculture in this Island, and has seen with pleasure the proposal lately made to His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, for the establishment of Agricultural Societies upon an improved principle, for the purpose of encouraging this object.

Moved by Joseph Bell, Esq.—2. Resolved, That this Society is of opinion that the Branches of the proposed Central Society should not be limited to any particular number; but that they should be established in every part of the Colony where the people desire them, and are disposed to support them.

Moved by H. C. Green, Esq.—3. Resolved, That as St. Eleanor's is the most central position of Prince County, and took the lead in endeavouring to improve the Agriculture of the Island by the establishment of an Agricultural Society in 1826, which has been in successful operation ever since, a branch of the proposed Society ought to be established at this place.

Moved by Mr. James Campbell—4. Resolved, That the Rev. Dr. Wiggins and Harry C. Green, Esq., be deputed to lay the foregoing Resolutions before the Meeting, to be held in Charlottetown on Thursday the 18th instant.

MEETING AT PORT HILL.

At a Public Meeting held at Port Hill, 13th January, 1849—Joseph Higgins, Esq., in the Chair, Neil McLean, Secretary. Moved by Mr. David Ramsay, seconded by Mr. Archibald Montgomery—

That this Meeting, viewing the vital importance of Agriculture in the Country; and conscious of the stimulus given to the improvement in Agriculture, by the exertions of Agricultural Societies, whenever they have been fairly tried—

Resolved, unanimously, That this Meeting express the high satisfaction they feel at the prospect of the formation of such Society in Charlottetown; and in connection with it, of similar Societies throughout the principal divisions of the Island.

Moved by Mr. Neil McLean, seconded by Mr. Dougald McArthur—

Resolved, unanimously, That from the local position of Townships 11, 12, 13, 14, &c., and their real importance, either as respects their inhabitants, commercial importance, or Agricultural capabilities, this Meeting conceive that should their interests be overlooked in the plans of the Central Society, about to be established in Charlottetown, a very serious public injury would be the result.

Moved by Mr. William Campbell, seconded by Mr. William Brown—

Resolved, unanimously, That a committee of Seven persons, and a Secretary, be appointed, to bring the subject of the establishment of a Branch Society at Port Hill before the promoters of the Central Society scheme, at the general Meeting to be held at Charlottetown on the 18th instant; or before the Governor and Legislature, if need be, in order to the securing of a full participation in any general Agricultural scheme, receiving Legislative aid. That such Committee consist of the following individuals, viz.: Joseph Higgins, Esq., James Yeo, Esq., Rev. W. H. Cooper, Mr. David Ramsay, Mr. William Campbell, Mr. Dougald McArthur, Mr. Archibald Montgomery, Mr. Neil McLean.

Moved by Mr. Neil McLean, seconded by Mr. Norman McLellan, and—

Unanimously Resolved, That the Rev. Mr. Cooper and James Yeo, Esq. be nominated a Deputation to attend the approaching general Meeting, to be held on 18th inst., at Charlottetown, to represent the interests of this section of the Island; and that a Copy of the Resolutions passed at this Meeting be transmitted to Mr. Cooper, now absent in Charlottetown, to be brought before the same.
