TORONTO (CP) — A Roman Catholic prelate said Tuesday that Christian teachings about Jews are a root cause of anti-Semitism, including the mass murders by the Nazis. Most Rev. Philip Pocock, co-adjutor archbishop of Toronto, told a Jewish audience at Holy Blossom Temple that although Jews are not blamed in the Bible for the crucifixion of Christ, New Testament teachings were "turned in the direction of anti-Semitism."

Jim Burden States Views

A problem of molting and spawning of lobsters would develop if lobster fishing was permitted in July on Prince Edward Island, Jim Burden of the Fisher Brothers Company, said yesterday. He said it was in July that most lobsters spawn and lose their old shells to grow new ones.

Mr. Burden was commenting on a suggestion that "a limited number of lobster fishermen on P.E.I. be permitted to fish during the months of July and August under strict federal supervision", made by J. David Stewart in the Legislature yesterday.

During the month of July lobster has to be brought to the Island from New Brunswick or Nova Scotia. Mr. Burden said that the volume is not large enough to make it a paying business. He said that the cost is great and the profit almost nil.

He also mentioned that in Nova Scotia the lobster season is open all year round, but in different areas of the province. At present it is open in the Yarmouth area. When that season closes another one opens in another part of the province. Mr. Burden said he was in no position to say whether such a plan would work on Prince Edward Island but that it would certainly be worth looking into.

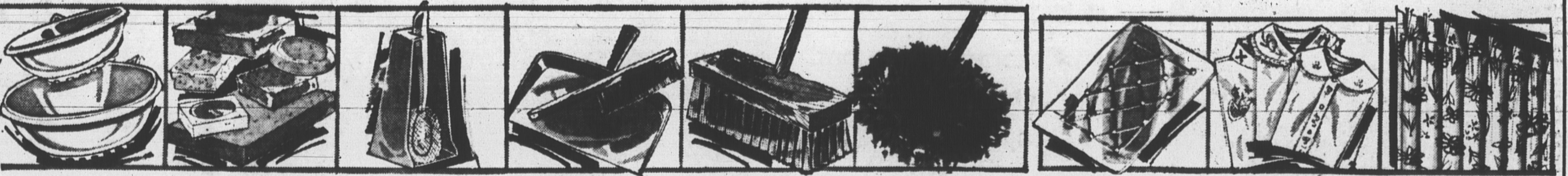

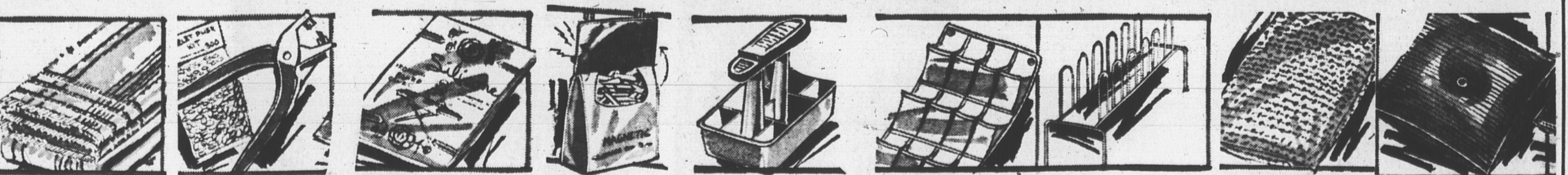
