past few years was Baroness de Hueck. Last Friday night, after the exams that day, she addressed the students in the Assembly Hall. She is of Polish descent and is married to an Irish-American. She is the foundress of the various Friendship Houses in the different dioceses across Canada. For many students, we are sure, it was their first acquaintance with a woman who was as eloquent as she. The general theme of her speech was Catholic Action—just what we mean by that term, and what is required of us to be Catholic Actionists. It is very seldom these days that one has a chance to meet a person such as her, so grounded in the Faith, and that it why we consider ourselves very privileged in having her.

could! Or, ask the practising minister of the Gospel, the social worker in the community, or the insurance agent. Most of all of them will tell you that the facts are against the assumption that what is called "social" or "moderate" drinking pays in the end. We do well to bear in mind two simple facts: (1) Every alcoholic, so-called, was recruited from the ranks of the moderate or social drinker; (2) Every moderate drinker is a potential addict, no matter how much he may think he has himself under control.

But it is when the problem is viewed under the specifically Christian structure of life and thought that it assumes most urgent focus. "Look carefully how you walk," Paul is saying to these Christians at Ephesus; and continues: "And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit." These twice-born folk were to be "drunken" indeed, but with a new kind of wine. They were to be filled with the Spirit of their Redeemer! And if you had asked them why, they would have told you that as Christ's redeemed, they were to illustrate a new standard of conduct in a morally decadent society. They (these first Christians) would reply to Cain's question, "Am I my brother's keeper?" with an emphatic Yes! There is, then, for the lower of Jesus, the fact of social responsibility. I have personally known not a few men and women who could easily have developed fondness for drink. They have resisted temptation because, as Christians, they have heard the patter of others' footsteps behind them. They know themselves to be their brother's keeper, kicking feebly.
