

# New Study Proposes Regional Health Service Reorganization

TORONTO Lack of food is causing great privation in India, but the situation is not as alarming as press reports earlier in the year indicated, according to a Canadian clergyman just returned from a three-week trip during which he visited major cities of the sub-continent including Pakistan.

Rev. Canon Morse C. Robinson, associate general secretary of the Anglican Church of Canada,

visited a department of missions, visited New Delhi, Calcutta, Amritsar, Karachi, and Lahore. In his capacity as co-ordinator of the Anglican World Mission Fund he evaluated projects underway in the Church of India, Pakistan, Burma and Ceylon which are being supported by grants of the Canadian church.

"The complexity of Indian life makes it virtually impossible to assess the food situation with any degree of accuracy," said Canon Robinson. "There are so many factors, political, economic and social, but probably some 40 per cent of India's 500,000,000 people are underfed and millions more exist on the wrong kind of food."

He said that Indian leaders are critical of the use of such words as famine. It is true that drought has made inroads in this year's food grain harvest, but over a 15-year period food production increased by some 50 per cent. As against this the population increased by some 30 per cent.

"While agricultural improvement is of primary importance, it must be borne in mind that the government is confronted by problems involving industrial development, defence spending and education," said Canon Robinson. "Despite all the difficulties however the new five-year agriculture program may see the 1966 food-grain production of about 75,000,000 tons increased to 125,000,000 tons in 1971."

Part from several thousands of dollars sent to the sub-continent to aid drought-stricken areas and the maintenance of the well-known rural training centre at Ajnala in the Punjab and others, the Anglican Church of Canada is not extensively involved in agricultural programs, said Canon Robinson. But a large portion of the \$750,000 sent over the last three years has been geared to education in a

Christian context and supports the training of technical and academic leaders that is imperative for the nation's development in a scientific age.

"Since early in 1964, Anglican World Mission Fund grants for a variety of emergency projects in the Church of India, Pakistan, Burma and Ceylon have amounted to \$181,000," he said. "During the same period the Canadian church's department of missions has committed some \$500,000 to its continuing, regular missionary work, and about \$25,000 went to aid refugees and disaster victims through the Prime Minister's World Relief Fund."

"AWM grants are intended to help Indians and Pakistanis to help themselves and special attention is paid to leadership training."

At Kalyani, the new university town near Teerthapattinam, for example, \$61,900 was provided for a student centre while lay-training and literature centres in Karachi cost \$32,250. Durgapur, about 100 miles northwest of Calcutta, provided one of the highlights of Canon Robinson's visit. The industrialized area, population 1,500,000, is the scene of what may be the world's biggest ecumenical experiment to cost \$250,000 with the Anglican World Mission Fund contributing \$50,000. Roman Catholics, Anglicans, Methodists, Presbyterians and Baptists are working as a team on the project which includes the building of churches, community and recreation centres. Most of the buildings have been completed and the church leaders now are busy reconciling their different denominational attitudes to bring the scheme to a successful conclusion.

# New York Stock Exchange May Be Forced From City

NEW YORK (AP) — Keith Funston, New York Stock Exchange president, said here the newly negotiated state stock-transfer tax may yet drive the exchange out of New York.

Funston called the proposed 25-per-cent increase in stock transfer taxes injurious to city, state and the exchange community, and discriminatory to "our customers—the nation's investors."

"As we have said repeatedly, the exchange wants to stay in New York. But if our customers are driven away from New York because of the added tax burden of doing business here, we will be forced to follow them."

The transfer-tax increase was part of a \$253,000,000 city tax package agreed to Thursday by state and city officials.

New York Mayor John V. Lindsay had sought a 50-per-cent increase, but apparently was dissuaded from such a large increase by Governor Nelson Rockefeller and City Council President Frank D. O'Connor. Funston earlier had stated that such a boost would force the exchange to move.

The current transfer tax rate in the state on cash sales of stock is one cent a share for issues selling at less than \$5 a share; a penny a share increase is added to the rate at increments of \$5 up to four cents a share when the price of each share is \$20 or more. The tax is paid by the seller.

The new tax, designed to raise additional \$35,000,000 annually, would be levied and collected by the state and turned over to the city.

Called it Sabotage
