FIGHT CONTINUES

Active TB Cases Found Hit All-Time Low At 30

"Difficulties Remaining in Tuberculosis Control" was the topic chosen by Dr. G.E. Maddison, director of tuberculosis control for New Brunswick, for his address to the 25th annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Dr. Maddison is past president of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association and Canadian Thoracic Society. He is a Fellow of the College of Chest Physicians and is certified by the Royal College of Physicians of Canada.

"Tuberculosis has been a scourge to mankind all down through the ages," Dr. Maddison said. "It can be traced back as far as changes in the bone structure of mummies. In early fiction it became a good medium to take away the beautiful girl of the story. The Bronte Sisters and the Barret family all suffered from consumption.

In the last 15 years the number of cases has shown a marked decrease in this country. The x-ray examination of the chest is of great importance in detecting tuberculosis, he said.

The tuberculosis problem "would be simple if the chests of all the population were regularly checked. We have drugs to treat patients — we can almost promise a cure to the recently infected person.

NOT COMPLETE
"Our work is not complete, and may not be for many years. We have a disease which is insidious — I call it sneaky — and we do not know where it will turn up. We know that like

a fire it has been put down by the combined effort of many fighters. But it is smouldering and if not watched it can spring up again," he said.

Dr. Maddison then paid tribute to volunteer organizations and said in closing, "You know what must be done, you know how to do it, and this fight which is so worthwhile must be continued."

He was thanked by Dr. T. Gencheff.

New officers for the coming year include: Walter Coulson, president; H.G. MacWilliam, vice-president; Robert Schurman, second vice-president; Dr. W.R. Stewart, secretary, and L.J. MacLellan, treasurer. Other executive members include Morton Dew, H.T. Holman, Dr. F.A. MacMillan, Rev. T.H.B. Somers and Rev. Andrew Macdonald.

12 CASES REACTIVE
The retiring president's report, given by Dr. F.A. MacMillan, stated that the number of active cases reported in P.E.I. this year reached an all time low of 30. There were also 12 cases of reactivation.

The report also told of Dr. E.M. Found being the recipient of the CTA overseas scholarship during 1964 and of his being elected president of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association.

Dr. Found, executive-advisor of the association, gave an historical sketch on tuberculosis on P.E.I. He stated that since 1925 the death rate because of TB has been lowered from 116 per 100,000 to 1.9 per 100,000.

He advised, however, that "the levelling off of morbidity and mortality, the occurrence of several epidemics throughout our province during the past five years, and the problem of drug resistance are warnings we must not ignore."

Dr. Found paid a special tribute to Fred A. Coyle and J.J. Connolly for their assistance in breaking down the mailing list of Easter Seals into correct post office addresses.

Blanche Conway, seal-sale secretary, reported that the 1964 Easter seal-sale reached an all time high of \$13,710, an increase of four percent. Money from

seals went to buy a new mobile x-ray van.

6,461 X-RAYS
Morton Dew reported on the mobile x-ray survey for the past year. In all 6,461 x-rays were made by the unit. The resulting discoveries were made: four cases of tuberculosis, two cases of pleurisy and 20 non-tuberculous chest diseases.

Dr. John Gillis reported on community-wide tuberculin testing and x-ray survey. He paid a special tribute to Mrs. J.E. Cameron and her 200-300 volunteer workers from women's clubs who organize and conduct the clinics. In 1964 clinics were held in 19 centres comprising 78 school districts in King's and Queen's counties. The total number tested was 6,400. The number of positive reactors under the age of 40 years was found to be 9.3 percent in 1964 contrasted with 15.3 percent in 1963.

The overall TB statistical report was given by Erma Tait, RN. There were 269 active cases last year along with 614 inactive cases making a total of 883. These cases are examined regularly at the five outpatient clinics.

Graduating in the degree course were Kenneth Mellish of New Perth, P.E.I. and Keith Douglas of Charlottetown.

Three Prince Edward Island agriculture department prizes went to: 1. A.C. Forbes, Miscouche; 2. M.P. Beagan, Charlottetown; and 3. Robert H. Wood, Mt. Herbert. All three completed their certificate course. Also completing his certificate course was Charles Power of Johnston's River.

Two Ont. Men Fined For Unlawful Peddling

GEORGETOWN — Acting Kings County Stipendiary Magistrate Charles R. McQuaid, QC, disposed of a large docket here yesterday. Representing the crown in all cases was Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur McGuigan, QC.

Deszo Dikasz of Hamilton, Ont., represented by William A. Reddin, was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days under the pedlars' act for unlawfully selling goods without a license. Fined \$40 and costs was Bella Molar of Toronto, represented by Mr. Reddin, and also charged under the pedlars' act.

The two accused were reportedly selling watches and one had in his possession an out-dated resident of the province license. Lawrence Grover Smith of Dundas, charged under the Excise Act, represented by Bert Campbell, pleaded not guilty and had his case adjourned for trial at Charlottetown, May 11, at 7.30 p.m.

Philippe Joseph Mallais of Grande Mitis, Que., pleaded guilty and was fined \$100 and costs for impaired driving.

No License Costs O'Leary Man \$50
ALBERTON — Ian Ross Strang, O'Leary, was fined \$50 and costs by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald at Alberton yesterday for driving while his license was suspended.

A charge of failing to yield right of way to traffic entering an intersection against Thomas Charles Barbour of Alberton was dismissed by the magistrate who stated that there were no stop or yield at the intersection in question making it difficult to decide who has right of way. Barbour was represented by Bruce MacDonald.

For failing to stop when signalled to do so by Alberton policeman John Arthur, Phillip James Shea, Pleasant View, was fined \$25 and costs.

Sydney Leslie Getson, Kildare Capes, was fined \$10 and costs for permitting an improperly equipped vehicle to be operated on the highway, and Ray Dennis Millman, Alberton, was given a similar fine for driving without a license.

An O'Leary man and a man from Alma received fines of \$20 and costs for illegal possession of liquor.

A Tishish resident was fined \$20 and costs for intoxication.

CN To Install ReflectORIZED Crossing Signs

The Canadian National Railways will install 28 reflectORIZED signs at level crossings on Prince Edward Island this year.

A total of 121 signs will be installed in the Atlantic provinces alone out of 1,250 across Canada.

Installation of the signs is a continuation of CN's policy of providing increased protection for motorists using highway crossings at night.

The signboards are erected at each side of a crossing facing oncoming traffic. When caught in the beam of an automobile's headlights they reflect, a bright silver glow indicating the crossing. When there is more than one track at a crossing, an auxiliary signboard showing the number of tracks is also erected to afford maximum protection for the motorist.

Prince County Vocational Students Tour

GEORGETOWN — Officials of Bathurst Marine Ltd. here announced yesterday that on Friday, May 7, 14 welding students from the Prince County Vocational High School in Summerside will pay a visit to the Bathurst Marine shipyards.

During the visit the students will be taken on a tour of the plant and shown all phases of ship construction, with special emphasis being placed on welding procedures.

Most of the welding at the plant is by AC transformer welders with one or two special purpose machines giving AC and DC output.

Less-Leader Selling Plan Sparks Quarrel

MONTREAL (CP) — The tobacco and confectionery distributors of Canada are at war, A. J. Duhamel, managing director, National Association of Tobacco and Confectionery Distributors, said Wednesday at the association's annual convention.

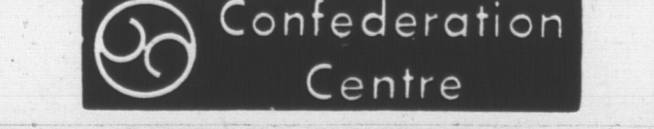
