Truck, Car in Collision Near Iona Yesterday

An accident involving a gravel truck and an Anglia car occurred yesterday afternoon about two miles west of McCabe's store on Iona. The loaded gravel truck, driven by Louis McHerron of Montague, was proceeding from the gravel pit to Flat River, when it met the Anglia car, driven by David MacBeth of Boston, who is vacationing at Point Prim, at a narrow bridge. Accompanying Mr. MacBeth was his brother-in-law's nephew, John MacLeod, 13 years old.

The car was struck in passing by the box of the truck, and completely turned over landing again on its wheels, and facing across the road. The boy was thrown out of the car, and was found lying unconscious on the road. Mr. MacBeth received several cuts and bruises. On the arrival of the R. C. M. P. from Charlottetown the boy was taken immediately to the Kings County Hospital at Montague where his condition is described as not serious, but requiring observation. The car, owned by Mr. MacBeth's brother, James, of Iris, is almost a complete wreck, while the truck suffered only minor damage to the box.

Georgetown, with Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presiding, the jury announced its verdict as "We find the accused who stands charged with having murdered Mary Ann MacKinnon, was insane at the time of the commission of the offence and we declare that we acquit him of the said offence on account of such insanity."

Following the announcement of the verdict which came at an early hour on Sunday morning, July 13 last, Chief Justice Campbell, on recommendation of the Crown Prosecutor J. O. C. Campbell, ordered that the prisoner be kept in strict custody in the Georgetown Jail until the pleasure of the Lieutenant Governor is known.

MacDonald has been in the jail in the Kings County capital since that time. It is not known when he will be moved to the jail here.

Shot Through Window

At the time of her death Mrs. MacKinnon was sitting in the kitchen of her home saying the Rosary with her family in the customary family evening prayers. While doing so she suddenly slumped over in her chair after being hit by a small calibre bullet which went through her head and was afterwards found on the other side during a post mortem examination. MacDonald was arrested in bed at his home two miles distant that same night. Footprints, which the Crown Prosecutor attributed to him, were found in the MacKinnon neighborhood and a horse apparently tethered in a grove nearby was believed to have come from the MacDonald farm. A .22 calibre rifle with sawed-off stock, which the Crown said fired the fatal bullet, was found in an open garage near MacDonald's home.

The prisoner had had trouble with Mrs. MacKinnon who had filed a charge of rape on her daughter against him prior to the shooting. The other charge was pending at the time of the shooting and MacDonald was out on bail.

In Georgetown Jail

After his arrest on the charge of murder he was confined in the County Jail at Georgetown and appeared before Magistrate Joseph A. MacDonald in December. The preliminary hearing was adjourned several times before being completed in January of this year. The magistrate then committed him for trial before the Supreme Court.

Representing the accused at the preliminary hearing were Mr. H. Frank McPhee, Q. C., leading defence attorney, and Mr. James Johnston who conducted much of the questioning during the preliminary hearing. The Crown was represented by Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, Q. C., Deputy Attorney General.

Second Salvage Tug En Route To Georgetown

A second powerful tug owned by Foundation Maritime is en route to Georgetown to attempt to refloat the German freighter Hendrik rigger aground on Barnt Point reef since Monday morning.

Yesterday the Foundation Vera made an attempt to free the partially loaded ship without success. Then later in the day it was learned that the Foundation Frances had sailed from St. John's, Nfld. for Georgetown. It was expected it would require some 36 hours for her to make the trip and that it would probably be Saturday morning before she would be able to put a line on the freighter.

The ship is possibly more than a mile off shore on a shelving rocky ledge and appears to be very hard aground. Apparently she has suffered little or no damage and is in no danger while the weather continues fine. Perhaps the greatest threat would from a southeast gale.

Man Found Dead In Boat Off Belle River

Mr. Alden Marshall Smith, age 78, of Belle River was found dead in his boat yesterday morning. It is understood he went out to the fishing grounds in the morning about 5:30, and at 6 a. m. Mr. Fred Beaton saw his boat drifting with the tide. He quickly launched a boat, and when he arrived he found Mr. Smith lying dead in the bottom of his boat. Dr. M. L. Bonnell, who was called to the scene, placed his death as due to heart failure. There will be no inquest.

The late Mr. Smith was born in Mosher River, N. S. He moved to P. E. I. in 1897, where he took up residence.

He married Mary Beers, of Belle River, who survives him. Also surviving are two sons, Edwin, Phinette, and Bill, Flat River, and four daughters, Christine, Mrs. William MacKenzie, Pinette; Florie, Mrs. Hughie MacPherson, Flat River; Annie, Mrs. Wallace Stewart, who resides with her parents; Marian, Mrs. Peter Beaton, Belle River.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon from his late residence. Interment will be in the Belle River Cemetery.
