Counting On Islanders

WHEN ST. DUNSTON'S University Saints take the field against Stadacona Sailors here Oct. 3 in their first Atlantic Football Conference clash of the season, coach Ed Hilton will be hoping for a lot of action from close to a dozen Islanders just out of high school ranks.

"Last season was considered a building year," said coach Hilton, "but the things were done to get graduates, eligibility and few new outside players—we'll start from the ground again."

Considering what coach Hilton had to finish with St. Dunstan's had a good season in '63. The club finished with a 3-4 record and he has only two wins over the opponents since then.

There are two low returners back. On offence, Dave Morton at centre, Jim Griffiths at half back and McElroy at fullback. On defence, Ed Lawler, Cyril MacDonald, Don 'Boss' Chandler, Willie Fisher, Ken Hickox and Harry Gaudet. "We have started thinking about defence," said Hilton, who has had from 10 to 15 players in camp for two weeks. Maybe Hilton believes in the old theory that the best defence is a good offence because it has been observed that it has been concerned with to date.

"The first year of college ball can be better played on high schoolers," said Hilton, "because they have the same age and some of them will probably be our better players in seasons to come. And the better the High School set-up, the better the college players will be."

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St. Mary's Could Upset

ST. DUNSTON'S don't figure on clipping the wings of the perennial AFC favorites St. Francis Xavier, this season. But this is the year the trick could be accomplished by St. Mary's.

The Huskies, once again guided by Bob Hayes, boast a veteran studied backfield and a defensive line that will average slightly over 200 yards per game. Last season they were tipped 14-1 by Don Lowe's X-Men, in Antigonish.

The returner from last year's players, reported for the opening practice session at the St. Mary's campus two weeks ago, Hayes says he'll cut 25 players before they play their opening game against the X-Men, Sept. 25.

St. Mary's has 15 players returning from the '63 team, but Hayes insists the success of the squad will depend on the play of their 15 rookies.

Offensively, the Huskies should look much the same as in the past season. Dave Murphy, last year's leading passer in the AFC, is back while 1963 Rookie-of-the-Year, Paul Punn of Toronto, will be in the fullback slot. Al Keith, a Charlie White will battle four rookies for the other backfield positions. Stu O'Brien has called down one end position and John Schmeickler at fullback.

Frank Archambault, Peperell, Mace, 235-pound, 6'11" tackle, will get two weeks for his first tryout. As a tight end, regarded. Returning defences include Dan Skilling, Bob Rutledge and Peter Grant. A mixture of returnees and rookies will fight for other offensive positions.

All in all, the Huskies should make it an interesting season for Don Lowe.

Chain Meeting Jones

The WBA action was taken after Clay had signed for a forbidden title defense against Sonny Liston for Nov. 16 at the Boston Garden.

A returner Clay - Liston title match was banned by the WBA at its Norfolk, Va., convention, Aug. 28, because Clay had signed with the Physical Education Commission to return to a return-bout contract in case of victory before the first Clay-Liston fight at Miami Beach, Feb. 25.

In vacating Clay's title, WBA president Mervyn D. Dintin of Toronto named four candidates for an elimination tournament to determine the next heavyweight champion.

The WBA's top four candidates were 1. Ernie Terrell of Chicago; 2. Cleveland Williams of Venice; 3. Floyd Patterson of Scrabble, N.Y.; and 4. James Frazier.

HEAVYWEIGHT (AP) — Delegates to the World Boxing Council meeting voted mystifyingly Tuesday over the decision of the Massachusetts Boxing Commission to stage the world title return bout between heavyweight champion Cassius Clay and Sonny Liston.

From a Filipino delegate, Justiano Montano of the Oriental Boxing Commission, came out-right condemnation "It is a shame. I cannot understand how Massachusetts could have okayed that meeting," he said.

Association representative from Miami Beach, Fla., told the congress, "I am very surprised that the Massachusetts body approved that fight."
