Hon. J. Angus MacLean, MP for Queens, was informed yesterday that the Farm Credit Corporation is not closing out its office in Charlottetown.

Mr. MacLean had asked Bruce Beer, parliamentary secretary to Agriculture Minister Harry Hays for assurance that the supervisory zone office was not being moved to Moncton.

Mr. Beer said the supervisory office in Charlottetown will be retained and the supervisor there will have the sole responsibility to supervise the corporations services to the farmers of P.E.I.

NEW YORK (AP)—Former President Harry S. Truman says the late Gen. Douglas MacArthur, whom he fired as Far East commander in 1951, was aiming at becoming president.

"He didn't fool anybody," Truman said, "and least of all did he fool me."

Truman's observations came in the second of a series of television programs.

Truman fired MacArthur during the Korean War over a policy conflict. He said the general wanted to carry the war across the Yalu River into Manchuria while Truman wanted "to limit the war to Korea... to prevent a third world war."

## Canned Meat Sought Here After Error In Production

TORONTO (CP)—Canada Packers Limited is trying to locate 48,000 tons of processed, beef luncheon meat sold to consumers in Ontario, Quebec and the Atlantic provinces before an error in the canning process was discovered.

A company statement said the meat sold under the trade name Kikk, could deteriorate over a long period and might then cause serious illness if eaten. Withdrawal of the meat by the company was voluntary.

A company spokesman said less than the normal amount of a certain ingredient was used in a batch of the meat made at the company's St. Clair Avenue and Weston Road plant here. It went on sale Sept. 14.

Canada Packers and Dr. C. A. Morrell, head of the food and drug directorate of the national health and welfare department, said the error was made by the supplier of spice units which normally contain the curing ingredient. The supplier discovered the error.

Canada Packers General Manager W. D. Lauby, said the best scientific opinion indicates the risk of impaired kidney function is small, but may exist. Therefore, there is a small chance the product could deteriorate and might then cause serious illness if eaten.

The company was primarily concerned about the effect if the meat was eaten after being stored by the purchaser for a long time—in a hunting camp, or cottage.

The affected cans bear the letters and numbers R27 7, indented on the top cover with one of the following numbers: 0214, 0216, 0217, 0224, 0225, 0224, 0224, 10054, 10024. Cans bearing any other combination of numbers and letters are not affected.

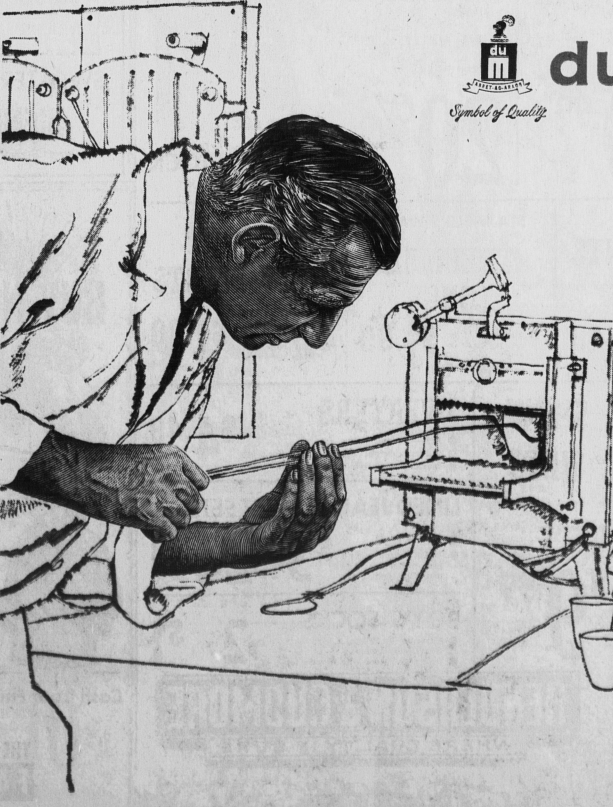
