SAD DEATH.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian is informed that the body of a widow named Gillis, was found under the snow in Robert K. Ibride's field line road, on Wednesday last. Mrs. Gillis left her home on the 20th of February.

CANADIAN SECURITIES.—During the week ending Feb. 24, Canadian 3 1/2 per cents advanced one per cent. in the British market, while the 3 per cents advanced a half per cent. The market value of 3 1/2 per cents is now 105 and of 3 per cents 95. Province of Nova Scotia 3 1/2 per cents sell at 98.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—Speaking of the Rev. Sydney Welton's case, the Halifax Recorder remarks: "Halifax narrowly escaped having a hand in the Welton sensation, as the North Baptist church had been corresponding with him to fill the pastorate when it was recently vacant."

CIVIC AFFAIRS IN MONCTON.—The Moncton City Council met on Monday night last to consider the proposed legislation. A change has been made in the bill increasing the number of aldermen from six to eight, providing that the two additional aldermen be elected by the people at large, the same as the mayor. Thus the ward representatives will not be changed.

THE CANADIAN HEN.—The Shelburne, N. S., Budget says: Mr. Samuel DeMings, formerly of Shelburne, and who for the last few years had resided in the United States, has returned to Shelburne, where he proposes to remain. He is erecting a new building near the town, on the Jordan road, for a henery, and proposes to go into the henery business somewhat extensively. His establishment will include all the modern improvements.

WAS TOO REALISTIC.—According to a recent despatch from Fort Dodge, Mrs. William Wilber, of Rowan, has been adjudged insane and sent to the asylum. The immediate cause of her being so adjudged was a graphic picture of a rebel drawn in the pulpit by her pastor. The pastor's description of the torments of the damned made such a vivid impression upon Mrs. Wilber's mind that her reason was overthrown and it is feared that she is hopelessly insane.

GUARDING AGAINST CHOLERA.—The Senate, a few days ago, discussed at some length D. Ferguson's notices calling attention to reports of a renewed outbreak of cholera in Europe, and asking what steps the government have taken to keep the plague from entering Canada. Hon. Mr. Angus gave a full explanation of the quarantine arrangements on the seaboard and land frontier and in reply to Hon. Mr. Poirer stated that provision had been made to guard the smaller maritime ports, such as Chatham, Chignecto, Port au Charlot, and so forth, in the event of cholera bearing vessels appearing in those harbors.

S.—We clip the following from the Collection for February: Through the kindness of the Benevolent Irish Society, the students of St. Dunstan's were given the opportunity of attending the last three lectures delivered under the auspices of the Society. Canadian Cattle.

THE COLONIAL SECRETARY'S STAND IN FAVOR OF CANADA.

The Montreal Star's London cable says: at the instigation of the Dominion government the colonial secretary is giving strong support to Canada's case now before the British board of agriculture, touching the schedule against Canadian cattle. The colonial secretary urges that the doubt heretofore entertained that Canada was not free from pleuro-pneumonia, a no longer tenable, while the new ninety days quarantine in the Northwest especially removes the last legal objection to the free entry of cattle exported from the Dominion. There is urgency in the matter, the memorandum adds, for both Canadian shippers and British importers should, in common justice be allowed to complete their season's plans early, and not be kept so long in suspense. In view of this new factor in favor of Canada, an early decision is probable, and the result is not to hope it will also be favorable.
