Union Speaker Criticizes Delay

James Dowell, director of education, Canadian Union of Public Employees, speaking last night at a meeting of Locals 805 and 824 hospital employees said the image of labor movement was seen by the average citizen as wrong and he condemned racketeering, corrupt labor leaders and Communist dominated unions.

He then challenged anyone to find fault with the program and activities in the democratic structure of the C.U.P.E.

He felt there was no justification for a two-year delay in bringing about a contract settlement.

Laying particular emphasis on the concept of collective bargaining, he charged that the government, on one hand, required that the union be certified and then on the other hand negated these rights. He was making particular reference to the wage dispute between the two unions here and the government where the government "has not taken

GEORGETOWN — The Georgetown Town Council at its regular meeting Monday night unanimously passed a resolution to bring the Town of Georgetown under the provisions of the Provincial Town Planning Act and the town clerk, Mrs. Joan Easton, was instructed to forward to the provincial secretary the necessary request to make this effective.

Coun. J. F. Johnson moved the resolution, which was seconded by Coun. A. H. Stewart.
