### Free Tuberculin Clinics To Be Continued Here

Dr. H.B. MacNeill, provincial minister of health stated that the tuberculin testing and x-ray clinics will be continued throughout the province during the spring, summer and autumn months of 1962 in a recent announcement.

Dr. MacNeill also said that "we, as Prince Edward Island should be proud that this method of detecting tuberculosis and affiliated diseases among the so-called healthy population was initiated on Prince Edward Island, and has now become

standard case finding procedure, not only in the United States."

Dr. MacNeill was high in his praise of the complimentary assistance of the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League in supplying a mobile x-ray unit, which carries all positive tuberculin reactors under the age of 40 years and x-rayed all over the age of 40 attending these clinics.

**30 ACTIVE CASES**  
During the past six years, 30 cases of active tuberculosis, requiring treatment were detected through the medium of the tuberculin testing and x-ray clinics, which concentrate on the so-called healthy population.

## Trade Commissioner Arrives in Province

"A lot of good things in a small parcel" was the way Prince Edward Island was described by Robert B. Gray, recently appointed New Zealand Trade Commissioner for Canada, who arrived in the province last night as part of a Maritime provinces trade tour.

Visiting Prince Edward Island for the first time, Mr. Gray said it reminded him very much of New Zealand. The only thing missing, however, was the mountains.

His Maritime tour is aimed at interesting business firms in trade with New Zealand and also making New Zealand better known as a tourist centre.

Mr. Gray pointed out in an interview that he has three objectives in mind. They are (1) encouraging a greater exportation of goods from New Zealand; (2) promoting New Zealand as a tourist country; and (3) getting industrial firms interested in investing in New Zealand.

While in Charlottetown, he will be calling on Mayor A. Walther Gaudet, members of the government, and other business officials.

He said the balance of trade has been three to one in favour of Canada, and it is steadily going up as New Zealand's exports are not increasing while Canada's exports are increasing rapidly.

He felt that if Britain joined the European Common Market it would have an adverse effect on New Zealand as it would not be able to expand as it did in past years.

Mr. Gray points out that New Zealand's exports are very limited as 90 per cent of its goods come from the land. He states that his main prospect in the exporting field is lamb, which he refers to as being "genuine spring lamb cut to 12 months old," and as being something which "can be sent any-

where with confidence." Mr. Gray leaves the province Tuesday when he will fly to Moncton, N.B., to continue his Maritime tour.

## Two Arrested On HMS Belfast In Drug Case

**VANCOUVER (CP)** - Two crew members were misting and two were under arrest aboard ship when HMS Belfast, largest cruiser in the Royal Navy, arrived here Saturday for a five-day visit.

Captain Morgan Giles, commander of the 10,000-ton ship, said the two under arrest will face trial in connection with discovery of nearly 45 pounds of narcotics aboard the ship just before she arrived in San Francisco while en route here from the Far East.

The ship is due in Portsmouth in mid-June.

The missing pair went absent without leave while the Belfast visited San Francisco.

## Recruit Natives
