

Just Flicka Is Double Winner In Races Under Lights Here On Saturday

Following up the big Old Home Week racing program which presented four days and four nights of top-notch racing entertainment last week, the Provincial Exhibition Association and Charlottetown Driving Park put on a smart nine-day dash program at the Exhibition Raceway on Saturday night to wind up the week's harness racing activities in gala fashion.

Just Flicka was the big double winner of the night's program when owner-driver Harold Cudmore of Brackley brought her home in front of Yankee Dale and Bonnie's Boy in battling finishes to the wire in both the second and sixth dashes. Claude O'Brien drove Yankee Dale to a place position in the second and third in the sixth, while Ike Moreside piloted Bonnie's Boy to show and place spots in the same event.

The winning honors were split on the other double events on the card. Billy McVey, with Walter Craig in the sulky, clipped off the number three event victory and Babe Britton was brought under the wire a winner over the same field in the seventh by Lt.-Col. D. A. MacKinnon.

Making his second winning drive of the night, Colonel MacKinnon brought his own Baron home in front of a six-horse field in the fourth, while Feather Duster was the big winner in the eighth race with Willard Kelly handing the ribbons. It was also Kelly's second win of the night, having guided his own horse Milldale to a victory in the opening dash on the program.

Mainland horses divided the honors in the fifth and ninth races when Ray O'Brien drove Dudy Budlong, owned by Dr. J. A. Donahue of Truro, N.S., to a win in the latter event and C. M. Alexander's All American from Saint John, N.B., to a win in the former event with Bill Burt making the winning drive.

Ontario Women Retain Golf Title

ST. CHARLES GOLF COURSE, Winnipeg, Aug. 20.—(CP)—Ontario women successfully defended their interprovincial golf title Saturday, retaining for another year the Royal Canadian Association Trophy won in Vancouver in 1949.

The four-player Ontario squad turned in a combined 36-hole total of 692 over the 6,516-yard, par-76 St. Charles layout—two strokes better than the runner-up Quebec foursome.

Quebec shotmakers were awarded the Crocker Trophy for the low net score of 664 as compared to Ontario's 668.

Ada MacKenzie, veteran Toronto golfer, paced the Ontario team with a 35-hole score of 188, followed by Mrs. N. J. Carlson 170, Anne Sharpe 178, and Mrs. J. H. MacArter 178.

Mrs. Graeme Pyke of Montreal took medalist honors with 164.

Final 18 holes will be played tomorrow, with the scores also serving as the qualifying round for the Canadian open. Unlike States and other events will be shot 18 qualifying holes tomorrow. Top 32 qualifiers will meet in match play Tuesday, with the final scheduled for next Saturday.

Well, the big week-long program of top-notch entertainment in Provincial Exhibition and Old Home Week celebrations is all over for another season and officials of the Provincial Exhibition Association have jotted down another success in their record books to the long list that has grown with the years.

Coming up with an outstanding program in this their Diamond Jubilee year, huge crowds have been thrilled all during the past week with the magnitude and calibre of the many entertainments, of which the harness racing, four days and five nights of it, played a major role.

It was a week of entertainment that left nothing to be desired, with good weather and huge attendances joining hands with record entries in live stock shows, exhibits, stellar racing and other entertainments, to mark sixty years of activities as a banner one to be remembered.

Charlottetown Yacht Club officials announced last night that they will hold their annual open Regatta Day in the local harbor next Saturday afternoon when a large number of entries in Snipe and Class III craft will take part in what is expected to produce keen competition and smart sailing.

On the streets, in offices and practically everybody's home the National League pennant chase is the No. 1 talk topic.

Everybody admitted it hasn't happened yet, and in the next breath said "but if—"

And in the same breath came the question: How do we get World Series tickets?

Only the old generation of Phillies fans could remember that. It's been 35 years since Pat Moran and his gang brought the only pennant the Phils ever won back to old Baker Bowl, a 35-year stretch when the club was the doormat of the League and deserved the nickname "Futile Phils."

Not any more, though. The club stopped being a doormat shortly after young Bob Carpenter bought control back in 1943.

Today it's a new, young ball club, complete even to pepper-striped red and white uniforms and a set of new nicknames, "Whizkids" and "Fightin' Philles."

And they've got the whole town talking.

The sports page is the best-read part of the newspapers. Radio in homes and offices, on street corners and in autos, blare the play-by-play of daytime games. At night you can walk any city or suburban residential neighborhood and keep track of the score.

There's greenbacked evidence in the Phillies office as mailmen every day add to the pile of Series ticket requests faster than they can be sent back to the requesters.

"We've already returned 25,000 applications," says publicity director Babe Alexander.

"We aren't accepting any applications now, and won't until we get a green light from Commissioner Chandler."

S'side Man Member Of Bisley Team; Miss Mary MacLennan Does Well

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 20.—(CP)—Alan H. Moorshead of Middlesex, Eng., a building contractor and a member of the 18-man British rifle team, Saturday captured the Governor-General's Gold Medal in the 82nd annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association shoot. The 52-year-old former Home Guard private posted an aggregate score of 169 of a possible 175 from 300, 600 and 900 yards to lead the field of 150 crack marksmen who qualified for the final stage of the match Thursday.

Moorshead posted his high score during a cold drizzling rain and a westerly wind that came in gusts. But it was just the kind of weather that Moorshead likes. "I get my best scores in this kind of weather," he said.

As is the tradition, Moorshead was "chaired" and carried by other members of the British rifle team off the firing ranges and was presented with the gold medal by the Governor-General, Viscount Alexander.

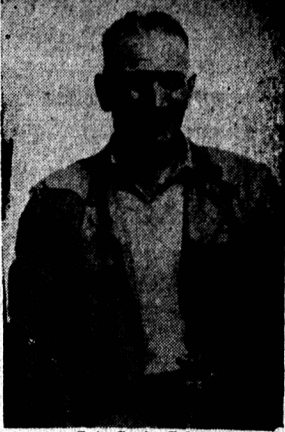
One of the best shots in England, Moorshead has been in the King's final at the Empire matches at the famed Bisley meet four times.

The Governor-General's Gold Medal was won last year by Lt.-Col. Stephen Johnson, 44, of Calgary, who did not take part in this year's six-day meet.

Two other members of the British rifle team also captured second and third places.

Maj. R. St. G. Maxwell of Suffolk, Eng., placed second with 168 out of a possible 175 and Maj. R. A. Fulton of Bisley, Eng., was third with 165.

Capt. G. H. Hirst of Calgary, led the Canadian marksmen with 163, and was followed by Bandsman W. R. Chandler of Vancouver, and Csm. N. L. Beckett of Hamilton, who tied with 162. Eight posted 160, including Miss M. MacLennan, Alexandra, P. E. I.; Capt. J. R. Newell, Winnipeg; and Sgt. J. MacNeil, Victoria.
