Nurses Home Contract For Kings Co. Hospital Awarded

The contract for the construction of a Nurses Home in connection with King's County Memorial Hospital at Montague has been let to the County Construction Company. Mr. F. W. Curtis, Company manager, states that the work on the new building will be started next week, and probably completed early in November. The hospital will adjoin the present Hospital and is designed to accommodate 12 nurses. It will be modern in every way with sitting and dining rooms, and all the essentials to provide adequate and comfortable quarters for the nursing staff. The plans call for a two storey building 55 x 40 with exterior finish of pine clapboards and full basement. The sub-contract for wiring has been let to Mr. Gilbert Clements of Montague.

The building was designed by Mr. E. S. Blanchard, architect Charlottetown, and the contract price is \$27,985. Other tenders submitted were M. F. Schurman Company \$34,485 and William Whiteway, Dover, P. E. I., \$35,000.
