 Form in to patties and fry at 350°. Serves three.

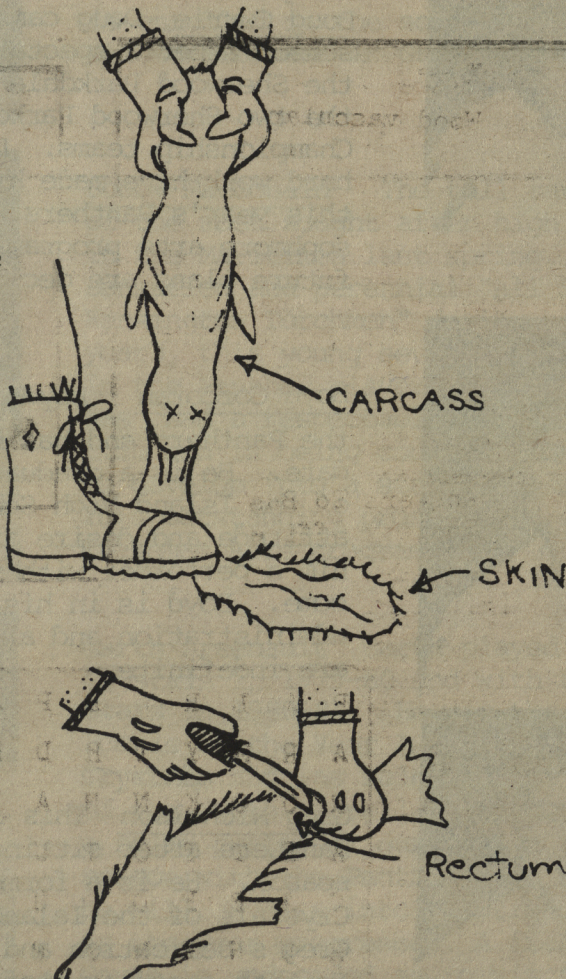
Seal Skinning

Six to twenty day old seals are preferred because they are quite gamey in flavor.

To skin, don thick gloves and make sure teh seal is at least unconscious. If not block off the windpipe with your thumb until it is. Next, make a small cut from the middle of the back flipper to its rectum. TEAR the skin away until you are able to grab the back flippers with your hands while stepping on the flap of skin with your boot. Now pull the skin with from the carcass the same as for rabbits, stopping only to cut away tough spots until the seal is totally skinned. If using only for the skin, chuch the carcass far enough away so as not to make you sick, otherwise gut the carcass and pack it away.

Once an Engineer Always an Engineer

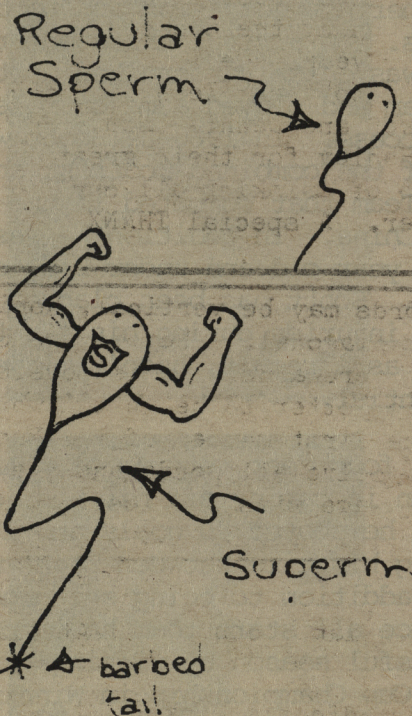
