An inquest into the death of John Herbert Wells was concluded at the Alberton court house last night with Coroner Dr. C. M. Dewar presiding and crown prosecutor George McMahon conducting the interrogation of witnesses.

Following evidence from five witnesses, the jury brought in the verdict that the deceased came to his death at the Western Hospital March 12, 1963, as a result of injuries received the same day when struck by a car on Church Street in Alberton, driven by Joseph Albert Gallant. They attached no blame to anyone.

The first witness, Dr. Stanley Helmich, Alberton, told the jury that he went to the accident scene and later attended Mr. Wells in the Western Hospital in consultation with Dr. Bruevils. Andrew Bruce Wells, Alberton RR 1, said he and his wife and three-year-old son, were visiting his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John H. Wells in Alberton and were proceeding west on Church Street in a horse drawn sleigh enroute home. Their grandfather, who was 82 was standing on the back of the sleigh holding on to the back of the seat and planned to go only a short distance to visit a friend. OPPOSES TESTS

Burns said the Canadian government remains opposed to all nuclear tests "anywhere and at any time."
