Creative Art Good Therapy For Mentally Ill

QUEBEC (CP) — Therapeutic art is on the way, Marie Laberge, poet, painter and registered nurse, has set up a freehand painting workshop at Quebec City's Saint Michel Archange Hospital, a mental institution.

Miss Laberge's experiment, which has been given support by hospital psychiatrists and psychologists, has already produced some interesting results: Patients of the institution have founded a monthly magazine called La Breche The Gap.

"These people must be encouraged to express themselves," says Miss Laberge of the 30 patients now enrolled in the program. "For artistic expression is really a form of auto-therapy which liberates the human being, and which may very well aid these patients regain their mental equilibrium."

"The trick is to leave each patient to his own designs and thereby to discover a peculiar mode of expression which may suit his personality."

"We simply let these patients do what they like, and for this reason they feel free to drop all inhibitions without fear of any scruples or social rules."

Now for advice: Background data indicate that your domestic opportunities for orderly social growth are limited. In short, you live in a socially unprivileged environment. Which means that you've got to plan foresightedly and act decisively, beginning today, to rise by your bootstraps to the good life that awaits those who want it enough to go after it, purposefully.

To start, become a member of the church community and the YWCA-activities program in your town. Enroll at once, and persevere in belonging.
