According to Earl Preston, C. N. E. Women's Division designer, there is not one article in it which can't be purchased easily in a department, furniture or appliance store.

The living room has one whole wall a white ribbon stone fireplace and one wall white. A section set in charcoal and white with a large low coffee table are grouped around the fire.

There are three bedrooms in the Dream Home—one a girl's room, one which is a combination bed and guest bedroom and the third the master bedroom.

The recreation or rumpus room has laminated wall panels in dark walnut and ceilings of dark wood.

The long kitchen is really three rooms in one with appliances forming the islands which divide it.

The woodwork is pink with matching walls and cupboards and the floor and counter top are dark green.

OVERTREATMENT OF SKIN DISEASES

A few months ago I wrote about the mistake we make in trying to treat ourselves for a persistent skin rash. As many skin rashes are due to allergy (being sensitive to some substance in the air, to food, or to substances which come in contact with the skin), it is often better to wait a few hours or even a day or two before applying treatment.

It is of interest to learn from the "Indiana State Medical Journal," Indianapolis, as stated by Drs. L. E. Gaul and G. B. Underwood, that they are convinced that overtreatment of patients is as great an evil as inadequate treatment.

Patients with a diagnosis of contact dermatitis and who had previous topical treatment (remedy applied directly to the skin eruption) were asked to bring in all the remedies they had used and the sequence of applications was recorded.

When the acute stage of the dermatitis had passed, patch tests were performed with these remedies. A patch test consists of applying the substance to the skin, covered by adhesive tape.
