## BULLER'S ADVANCE ON LADYSMITH.

## British Capture Krantz Kloof.

## BOMBARDMENT OF THE BOER POSITION RESUMED.

## Two Millions for the Canadian Contingents.

Fighting in Progress at Sterkstrom—The Montreal Herald's Correspondent and the Censor—Canadians Courtmartialled—News from Spearman's Camp—Prospects for the Relief of Ladysmith.

### SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

#### A LIVELY ACTION.

SPEARMAN'S CAMP, Feb. 7, 6 p. m.—General Buller commenced his advance for the relief of Ladysmith on Monday. The naval guns opened at 7 in the morning and a feint attack was made in front of our position, three battalions advanced toward the Brakfontein with six batteries.

At eleven o'clock the Boers opened with artillery fire and sent several shells among the British infantry who retired an hour later. Meanwhile a vigorous attack was made on the extreme right where the engineers expeditiously constructed a position. Several pieces of cannon half hidden among the trees on Zwart's Kop bombarded heavily.

The British infantry advanced and the Boers were entirely surprised.

At 4 o'clock, a high hill, a continuation of the Brakfontein, had been taken. The operations were excellently planned.

The name of the hill taken is "Krantz Kloof."

The bombardment of the Boer position was resumed this (yesterday) morning. The Boers worked a disappearing cannon from the high Doorn Kloof range on the right of the captured hill. But the British shells exploded its magazine and the gun was put out of action till late in the day.

Musketry fire was intermittent until the afternoon, when the Boers made a determined effort to retake the hill.

#### LABOUCHERE'S FOLLY.

NORTHAMPTON, Feb. 8.—The announcement that Henry Labouchere, editor of Truth and Liberal member of parliament for Northampton, would address a peace meeting in Northampton town hall last evening, drew a noisy crowd of opponents who swarmed upon the platform and smashed the chairs.

Labouchere's arrival was the signal for renewed attacks.

The promoters of the meeting were forced off the platform and chairs were hurled in the body of the house amid cries of "God Save the Queen."

Labouchere was struck on the head, but was not seriously injured. He managed to make his exit escorted by the police.

#### TWO MILLIONS.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—Hon. Mr. Fielding will move a resolution on Friday asking for two million dollars to provide for the Canadian South African contingents.

#### FIGHTING AT STERKSTROM.

Cape Town, Feb. 8.—Fighting began this morning at Sterkstrom and is now in progress.

No details have been received.

#### OUT OF ACTION.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—Three men of the Canadian Contingent, were court martialled by Colonel Otter for sleeping on sentry duty.

The correspondent of the Montreal Herald has been sent to Cape Town for endeavouring to evade the press censor. CORRESPONDENTS' REPORTS.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—A special despatch from Spearman's camp, dated February 7th, says:

"Our advance is at present prevented as the Boers enfilade us from their position on Spion Kop and Doorn Kloof. Our casualties, although estimated at 250, are trifling considering the great importance of the movement just concluded. LONDON, Feb. 8.—The Standard's correspondent at Spearman's camp, referring to the position, says: "The work accomplished so far has been magnificently done."

"The shell and maxim fire poured in by the Boers has been extremely severe. But our losses are comparatively speaking small."

The Durham Light Infantry took a few prisoners in the course of their charge.

The enemy, as usual, fought with the utmost stubbornness. British maneuvering, and accuracy of

aim on the part of the British artillery during the fighting on Monday were beyond praise.

There is not the slightest likelihood that the Boers will succeed in dislodging us from the positions we have gained.

The prospects of the relief of Ladysmith are decidedly hopeful."

#### LATER.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—Buller has cabled to the War Office that the approximate British casualties in the fighting at Poigierter's Drift up to noon on Tuesday were:

Officers—2 killed and 16 wounded. Non-commissioned officers and men, 216 killed and wounded.

The officers killed were Major Johnson Smyth and Lieut Shaft, of the Durban light infantry. Fitzgerald of the Durban Light Infantry and Lieutenant Sir J. A. Cunningham of the rifle brigade.

#### FEELING IN LONDON.

LONDON Feb. 8.—Presumably General Buller is fighting again today, in his third attempt to relieve Ladysmith.

News of the greatest importance may arrive at any moment. Yet there is more doubt than exultation, for even if the recollections of Buller's two disastrous failures after auspicious starts, were not keen in the minds of the public, the lists of casualties published to-day would be a sufficient reminder of the tremendous difficulties of his task.

#### LATER.

#### "RELIEF CERTAIN."

LONDON, Feb. 8.—A cable despatch received in this city from Spearman's Camp, under today's date says: General Buller holds the position and the relief of Ladysmith is certain.

A despatch to the Times from Spearman's camp says: "When the Durham's reached the top of the vaal Krantz, over fifty of the enemy, who were still defending the position, fled. More than half of these were armed natives."
