Lobstering In Illegal Area Brings Tignish Man Fine

ALBERTON — A Tignish fisherman, Eric McInnis, received a fine of \$10 and costs when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald Wednesday on a charge of fishing lobsters in a district not authorized by his license. Peter Joseph Bute, Tignish, was given a fine of \$25 and costs of 30 days for break and entry at the Alberton lobster store. Sentence had been deferred over a year ago pending good behavior of the accused. Bute was also fined \$10 and costs for spinning wheels on a motor vehicle.

The case of James Carl MacCallum of 152 King Street, city, was heard in Queens County Court yesterday morning and was adjourned for judgment to Sept. 3. MacCallum is charged with robbery with violence. Representing the crown and calling four crown witnesses was Allan K. Seales. For the defence Lester P. O'Donnell called two witnesses. Testifying for the Crown were the victim of the alleged robbery, Archibald J. MacPeters; John Richard Waddell, and Harry MacGulgan. All are from Charlottetown. Cat James Howatt of the Charlottetown Police testified to arresting it occurred following the incident.

Appearing for the defence were John James Shaw of Charlottetown and the accused. Following the hearing Judge C. St. Clair Trainor adjourned the case to Sept. 8 for judgment and remanded the accused into custody until that time.

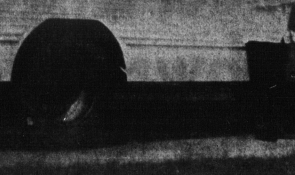

Mobile X-Ray Van Purchased by P.E.I. Tuberculosis League

The P.E.I. Tuberculosis League has recently purchased a mobile x-ray unit. It has been announced by the league.

Dr. F.A. MacMillan, league president, said the decision to purchase the van was made because an overall increase of tuberculosis cases made it appear the preventive program should be stepped up.

He said purchase of the van and of a new x-ray unit in 1963 was made possible through the sale of Christmas seals.

The original van bought by the league in 1945, completed its 18th year of operation a few days ago. The Charlottetown Gyo Club of the day sponsored the project.

Little Theatre Season Opens Next Month

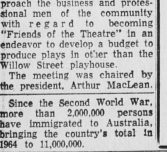

While the financial statement as presented by the treasurer, Mrs. Douglas J. Carmody, showed a depleted balance, it was learned that this did not include income from the Charlottetown Board of Trade for rental of costumes and makeup services by LITG members, or rental of the playhouse for auditions.

The meeting was chaired by the president, Arthur MacLean.
