

SHIP NEWS.

The brig, Dart, belonging to Messrs. Dingwell and Saunders, arrived at Grand River on Monday last, in 17 days from St. John's, N. F. Passengers—Messrs. Braddock, Dingwell Clark, Saunders, and about 50 others.

The Alpha, Egan, master, belonging to Mr. John McKenzie, New London, went on shore at Big Pond, Lot 45. East Point, in a snow storm, on Thursday night, the 2d inst. Fortunately for the owner, she is insured. She was from Newfoundland 14 days out.

The schr. Spray, D. Robinson, of Cavendish, master, was at St. Pierre, 26 days since. The Scottish Chief, McLellan, from Rustico, bound to St. Pierre, had not been heard of.

The Sarah Ann, McRae, from Point Prim, sold at Bermuda, for 1,400 dollars. The cargo consisting of potatoes, sold at 2s. 6d. six per bushel. The crew have arrived here.

The schr. Joseph, H. Webster, master, in 17 days, from St. John's Newfoundland, arrived off Pinette on Wednesday last, and landed Mr. Robert Longworth, one of her passengers. The Captain intends trying to get into this port, but we doubt very much whether he will succeed.
