

Britain Grabs Tourney Lead

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (CP) — Britain Friday defeated Canada 4-1 and took the lead in the Commonwealth women's golf tournament.

The victory over Canada, possibly the key match of the tournament which ends Saturday, gave the favored British team a 10-point lead over Canada and South Africa in the five-country race.

Canada plays Australia today and Britain meets South Africa in the final matches.

Friday's loss was the first Canada has suffered. It left Canada with four points, compared with undefeated Britain's six. Australia had two and New Zealand one.

ONE VICTORY

Mrs. Marlene Stewart Stritt of Toronto chalked up Canada's only victory on Friday, a 3 and -1 victory over Mrs. Elizabeth Price, newly crowned British amateur champion.

But Britain had racked up convincing victories in the morning's four-round rounds, and clinched the victory by taking three of the four singles matches.

George Chuvalo Is Acquitted

TORONTO (CP) — George Chuvalo, Canadian heavyweight boxing champion, was discharged Friday following preliminary hearing of a charge that he raped a 19-year-old mother.

Magistrate Donald Graham freed both the 21-year-old boxer and Ernest Holbrook, 22, accused of the same charge, after the mother admitted in court telling a friend a plan to sue the boxer for \$10,000 and settle for \$5,000.

The girl, who has a 17-month-old child, claimed early last month that Chuvalo and Holbrook lured her to a lonely section of suburban Rexdale where she was raped.

Defence counsel Arthur Maloney drew from her the admission of her plan for a civil suit and also called attention to medical evidence that she had no bruises.

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The Charlotteville track, which has more than 170 trotters and pacers training over it, saw a brilliant display of speed early this week when Convoir, P. 201, who is being trained by Harvey Cormier of Moncton, stepped the fastest mile of the season—2:14, with the last half in 1:03 and the last quarter in 30 seconds.

He was free-legged, and we understand trainer Cormier intends to race him that way.

Pat Lavers of Halifax was a visitor to the track on Thursday and received a warm welcome from his horsemen friends there. Pat has just returned from a trip to the far South, and found the change from the very hot temperatures there to the rather cool June weather here, a sharp contrast.

A top horseman, trainer and driver, he is on the lookout for a good trotter.

Harness racing in the afternoon will be staged at Historic Track in Goshen, New York, for its 105th year beginning July 6. The Grand Circuit meeting continues for one week at America's oldest trotting track.

More than \$147,000 in purses will be awarded. Among the races will be the \$32,000 Titan Free-For-All Trot on July 10; America's top trotters are entered in the Titan. Heading the list of favorites is Darn Safe 1:59 4-5, one of the world's leading money-winners. In five years of racing, he has won \$313,015. Other starters will be Charming Barbara, Trader Horn and Senator Frost. Twenty others have been kept eligible.

Scheduled to make his first appearance at this track will be Dancer Hanover, purchased at the Yearling Sales of the Hanover Shoe Farms last November for \$105,000. His trainer-driver, Stanley Dancer, has the colt entered in the Goshen Cup Pace on July 9.

The Commission of Investigation's code of ethics hearing on George P. Monaghan, who has been racing czar at Yonkers and Roosevelt tracks for several years, is being boycotted by Mr. Monaghan.

They have investigated his doings pretty thoroughly, but are leaving no stone unturned to find out how much his services actually cost "on the side". At the first open session last week the Commission produced evidence showing that Mr. Monaghan and his aides ran up bills totaling \$31,075 in the dining rooms of Yonkers, Roosevelt and Monticello Raceways, with the bulk of it at the first two tracks.

TOP STORY

John Gilpin's ride was one of the most interesting stories of our younger days. Then, of course, there have been the activities of William S. Hart, Tom-Mix, and Hoot Gibson. But never in history has there been such a performance by a harness horse as took place last Monday on the New York State Thruway, outside Yonkers Raceway.

The winner and loser was an exhausted and sobored three-year-old pacer named "Claim Agent." At 11:30 a.m. he was being given an easy jog as a part exercise in preparation for his race that night. All of a sudden he turned around, unseated his driver, and started out in search of freedom.

He went down Central Avenue, New York, with the sulky booming behind him, headed through various streets with a posse in pursuit, and was finally brought to a halt after stirring up a great deal of excitement but causing very little damage.

We look for new season's trotting and pacing records for the province to be set up at the Charlotteville raceway tonight. The trotting mark is 2:17 2-5, made by New Forest, driven by Emmet Bernard, on Monday night, and the pacing mark is 2:14 1-5, made by Mr. Rock, driven by Cyril Smith.

Conditions that night were about three seconds slow, and if tonight's weather is favorable the entire program will show that there is a lot of speed on tap, even at this, the beginning of the season.

Caretakers will have the oval in fine condition, and classifier E. Frank Acorn has a lineup that will give interest from first to last.

On Monday night, the feature race will be the free-for-all, and two of the most consistent pacers racing over half-mile tracks in the United States, Bertram Hanover, a nine-year-old by Titan Hanover, took a pacing record as a seven-year-old of 2:03 3-5 over a half-mile track, and a couple of years ago was one of the most heavily-backed pacers at Roosevelt and Yonkers, where he was in the stable of that super-reinsman Billy Haughton. He is owned by Samuel Johnston of Fortune Bridge and Charlotteville.

The other newcomer, Sky Prince, P. 208 3-5, is another very fast pacer that has met some of the best in the U.S.A. and defeated them. He is seven years old and is owned by Ray Stewart of Murray River, P.E.I.

The other starters in the race are horses that have been winners in many hard contests, and might possibly turn the tables on the two newcomers to the province.

FEW EXTRACTS

Charlotteville club officials are expecting a large number of golfers to participate in this national event.

Golfers of the local club are also reminded that the qualifying round for the Dowling handicap match will be played this afternoon.

A large entry list is expected to take part in this feature. Entries close at 1:30 at the pro shop.

Yankees Trounce Indians; Dodgers Drop Braves 5-1

CLEVELAND (AP) — New York Yankees, playing like world champions once again, routed Cleveland 11-2 Friday night on a blistering 17-hit attack that stunted home runs by Gil McDougald and Elston Howard.

The largest crowd of the season in the American League—9,335—watched in virtual silence as the Yanks sent the Indians to their sixth straight defeat.

Art Dignan pitched a strong seven-inning but lost his shutout bid when Billy Martin smacked an eighth inning home run. Rocky Colavito added the final Cleveland run with his 14th home run in the ninth.

Every Yankee in the lineup got at least one hit, except Mickey Mantle who drew three walks. Tony Kubek had four hits.

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Los Angeles Dodgers continued their long-time hex over Milwaukee's Warren Spahn Friday night as Johnny Podres spaced seven hits for a 5-1 victory over the Braves.

The Dodgers' only team with a life-time edge over Spahn, have defeated him 27 times while losing only 14 down through the years.

Spain dropped his second straight decision of the season to the Dodgers while failing to notch his 25th National League victory. He is 7-6 for the season.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Chicago Cubs lashed out 17 hits Friday night in a free-hitting game vs. Pittsburgh Pirates that Chicago won 10-5. The loss snapped a six-game winning streak for the Pirates.

The Cubs' attack was highlighted by home runs by Dale Long and Ernie Banks.

The Pirates garnered 14 hits off two Cub hurlers. Dick Stuur, smashed a 457-foot home run over the centerfield wall for two runs in the first inning.

CHICAGO (AP) — Pinch-hitter Larry Simpson's 3-run double broke a 2-2 tie in the eighth and enabled Chicago White Sox to widen their first-place lead with a 5-2 victory over Boston Red Sox Friday night.

Simpson smashed his bases-loaded clout off the fourth Boston hurler, Lou Kieley, and settled what had been a tightly pitched game witnessed by 32,321 in Comiskey Park.

DETROIT (AP) — Al Kaline's single drove in the winning run Friday night in the ninth inning as Detroit Tigers edged Washington 7-6 in a wild contest witnessed by 27,537.

Kaline's hit scored Eddie Yost, who led off the inning with a single against his old teammates and went to second on a sacrifice. Pitcher Camillo Pascual gave Charlie Maxwell an intentional walk to pitch to Kaline.

The Tigers had to overcome a pair of tremendous home runs by Bob Allison for the victory.

CINCINNATI (AP) — Big Don Newcombe, working his curves and changeups to perfection, tamed the slugger of San Francisco Friday night on three hits, leading Cincinnati's Reds in a 7-2 victory.

The 33-year-old right-hander tired in the last inning, but hung on and completed his victory.

A quick ringside poll of 12 boxing writers showed an unusual even split. Four thought Tiger won, four thought Calhoun won and four agreed with the draw decision.

It was the American debut of Tiger, a 29-year-old Nigerian whose real name is Die Ihetu who had won the British title last year by knocking out Pat McAteer.

There were no knockdowns although both men were wobbled as the lead changed back and forth between the two earnest scrappers.

The White Sox definitely will not be looking at any sort of such when they entertain the other Sox from Beantown. Everybody is acting tough this year. CLEVELAND INDIANS who finally surrendered first place to the White Sox Thursday evening have a whale of a show going in their huge stadium.

The world champions, the New York Yankees, are in town fresh from a 2-1 edge over Detroit Tigers in their recent series in the Motor City. That was really some accomplishment for the Stenard crew who up to this week were unable to take the measure of the Bengals.

This Cleveland-New York tussle is also a four-game affair. The first went last night, the second this afternoon and two big ones Sunday. This is tremendously important series to both clubs. First the Tribe needs to get the better of it lest they slip right out of contention. On the other hand, Yankees must conquer to close the gap separating them from the pace setters. LOS ANGELES DODGERS enjoyed immense success last season at the expense of the league champions, the Milwaukee Braves. However, that success has not carried over into this year. In fact, the Braves have not been too troubled with the Los Angeles outfit in 1959.

Tiger, Calhoun Battle To Draw

NEW YORK (AP) — Dick Tiger, the British Empire middleweight champion, and Rory Calhoun, muscular White Plains N.Y., mauler battled to a draw Friday night in a bitterly fought 10-round bout at Madison Square Garden. Calhoun weighed 163½, Tiger 163½ pounds.

It was a tight one all the way with Calhoun taking an early lead Tiger moving out front in the middle rounds and Calhoun closing with a rush. By winning the last round on all three official cards, Calhoun managed to gain a draw.

Judge Bill Reht scored it 6-3-1 for Tiger, judge Bill Frost had it 5-4-1 for Calhoun and referee Mark Conn called it 5-5 in both rounds and points. The Associated Press had it 5-5 with six points for Tiger and 5 for Calhoun.
