**Laurel & Hardy In The "Bohemian Girl" At Prince Edward**

Laurel and Hardy are themselves again! In their original screen version of Balfe's famous light opera which was produced on the stage nearly a century ago, the gay butlers, despite their colorful gypsy costumes, are more than the standard "Olle" the public has come to know and love, than they have been for several months.

Whoever was responsible for selecting Michael Balfe's musical classic as a background for Laurel and Hardy's antics is to be congratulated. The music, sometimes lilting and again pleading, is altogether delightful. What little of the original story of "The Bohemian Girl" is used in the modern screen version is sufficient to form the peg upon which a quick-paced and hilarious scenario is hung. At least last night's house at the Prince Edward Theatre seemed to thoroughly enjoy the picture from start to finish—and what a finish!

It would spoil the pleasure of those who have yet to see this feature comedy to reveal the story here. Suffice it to say that the plot revolves around a band of gypsies of which Laurel and Hardy are members. Love interest is sustained by Antonio Moreno, of whom Mae Busch, "Olle's" nagging wife is enamored.

Jacqueline Wells is seen in the role of Princess Arline as a young lady while four-year-old Olga Hood is the same character as a child. Other of the principals in the cast, all of whom give creditable performances, are James Finlayson and William F. Careton.

**Jack Holt In "Storm Over Andes" At The Capitol**

Rich in the color and glamour of South America, packed with romance, action and thrills, "Storm Over the Andes" started at the Capitol Theatre yesterday. The screen play deals with the adventures and loves of Jack Holt, rugged he-man of the movies, as an American aviator of fortune who got himself a job as a combat pilot with a warring South American nation. There he met a beautiful girl... he had a penchant for winning beautiful girls and returned to the front.

His commanding officer was sent out to bomb an enemy ammunition dump. He proceeded to crash. Holt went out after him and saved him by making a parachute jump. Both returned with the enemy's greatest aviator their prisoner.

Holt's performance was splendid but he was given close competition by Antonio Moreno, the handsome Spanish player, who is returning to the screen in this production after an absence of five years.

Mona Barrie, as the brunette charmer of Holt, is excellent possessing restraint in her touching scenes. Gene Lockhart turns in a laughable performance as Holt's insouciant mechanic.

The backgrounds are excellent, and include cafes, streets during a gay fiesta, lavish homes, and both fighting armies and airport.

**Over 20,000 Farm Loan Applications**

OTTAWA, June 4.—Of 20,441 applications for loans under the Canadian Farm Loan Act received during the six years 1930 to 1935 inclusive 5,989 were approved, according to a return tabled in the House of Commons today. Loans totalled \$1,989,950.

Loans approved by provinces were as follows: British Columbia, \$1,478,700; Alberta, \$3,997,400; Manitoba, \$1,285,000; Quebec, \$4,101,800; New Brunswick, \$195,250; Nova Scotia, \$361,200. Other provinces have not come under the farm loan legislation.

**SEED OATS DISTRIBUTION**—Hon. W. H. Dennis, Minister of Agriculture, reports that his department has imported and distributed among the farmers of the Province five thousand bushels of seed oats this season. As this seed was bought in carlots and sold at cost, it meant, he states, a considerable saving to the farmers. It was very apparent, however, that the farmers who sold good seed in the fall at a low price and were forced to buy this spring at almost double the price they received last fall, have suffered a serious loss. The Department is asking farmers throughout the province to keep their minds for the destroyed season and see that their seed requirements are provided for in the fall of the year.

**Fire Destroys Two Tenement Gaytown House**

A double tenement house and an adjoining dwelling at Gaytown on the outskirts of Charlottetown were gutted by fire yesterday with loss estimated at \$5,000.

City firemen found smoke pouring from both buildings when they arrived at the scene at 11:30 o'clock yesterday. They quickly laid 2,000 feet of hose from the nearest hydrant on Elm Avenue and in a short time had the blaze under control.

Mrs. Fanny Casford, owner of the double tenement house lost all her furnishings in the blaze which apparently started in her section of the building. Mr. Spencer, with his wife and two children, lived in the north side of the tenement. He estimated his personal loss at \$200. Names quickly spread to the home of Mr. A. C. Oullen, but firemen were able to save it after a struggle. It was badly charred and will have to be completely renovated.

Mr. Oullen's loss was partially covered by insurance but there was no insurance on the Casford building. None of the occupants could give any indication how the fire started. The buildings were about a mile outside the city limits.

**In Ottawa**

(C. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 4.—Federal authorities have no power to compel employers to pay wages to their employees on public holidays. Prime Minister Mackenzie King told the House of Commons today in answer to a question from J. S. Woodsworth, C. C. F. leader. It was a matter of provincial jurisdiction, he said, and the Civil Service Act already provided for payments on holidays to government employees.

**To Amend Criminal Code**

A general bill amending the Criminal Code, including changes in Section 98, will be introduced in the House of Commons next week, Minister of Justice Laperle announced today. He was replying to J. S. Woodsworth, C. C. F. leader.

**Third Reading**

With several clarifying amendments the Senate today gave third reading to the bill amending the customs tariff in accordance with changes announced in the budget. The measure increasing the sales tax from six to eight per cent was accorded first reading. Answering General W. A. Griesbach (Cons. Edmonton) Senator Raoul Dandurand, government leader, said that under the regulation allowing Canadian tourists returning from the United States to bring in \$100 worth of goods free, each member of a family of returning tourists would be permitted to have \$100 worth enter without payment of duty. The Senate, faced with numerous committee meetings, adjourned till Monday night.

**Housing Loans**

Loans under the Dominion Housing Act up to last May 31 totalled \$1,513,916, according to information given today in the House of Commons. These were divided by provinces as follows: Ontario, \$611,630; Quebec, \$738,728; Nova Scotia, \$26,880; Prince Edward Island, \$4,000; British Columbia, \$2,700. Since the return was completed loans have been started in the province of Manitoba, but they are not yet being made in the two other Prairie Provinces, nor in New Brunswick. The total number of loans by provinces up to last May 31 was: Ontario, 111; Quebec, 93; Nova Scotia, 6; Prince Edward Island, 1; British Columbia, 1.

**SPEAKS AT K. OF C. MEETING**—Dr. Claude Brown, Supreme Director of the Knights of Columbus, addressed the members of the local council at a special meeting. He spoke on the activities of the order. Present at the meeting were State Deputy, Henry Noonan of Summerside and His Excellency Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan of Charlottetown besides several members of the clergy. Dr. Brown arrived in the Province to do some work in a meeting of the Souris Council on that night. This evening he will speak at the Knights of Columbus Home in Summerside.

**P. E. I. Highland Band To Attend Draegermen Show**

Through the courtesy of Major C. C. Thompson, officer commanding the P. E. I. Highlanders, and in appreciation of the work done by Draegermen at Moncton, the P. E. I. Highland Band offered its services in connection with the Draegermen Show tonight. The band will parade to the Forum to render music besides adding extra colour to the show.

Premier Angus McDonald of Nova Scotia had the following to say regarding the Draegermen show. "It was one of the most dramatic and enlightening displays of the kind I have ever seen. It revealed the resourcefulness, the physique and the sheer courage which the men who do rescue work in the often gas-filled pits must have to carry on."

The Draegermen have a perfect layout at the Forum for their show tonight and you are assured of the best that money and bravery can produce.

**APPROVES USE OF TITLE "ROYAL"**

The King has approved the use of the title "Royal" by six corps of the non-permanent active militia of Canada, it was announced today by the Department of National Defence. Those allowed to use the title are: the Corps of Canadian Engineers; Canadian Corps of Signals; Canadian Army Service Corps; Canadian Army Medical Corps; Canadian Ordnance Corps, and Canadian Army Veterinary Corps.

**THE SENATE RAILWAYS COMMITTEE** will not hear witnesses on the Government bill creating a National Harbours Board. This was decided at a brief meeting today while A. W. L. MacCallum secretary of the Shipping Federation of Canada, waited to make a statement. Mr. MacCallum was informed the committee had changed its mind about hearing witnesses. Appreciation of his attending to give evidence was expressed, and he was told nothing would be required from him at least until details of the bill are under consideration. It is possible then the committee will call witnesses.

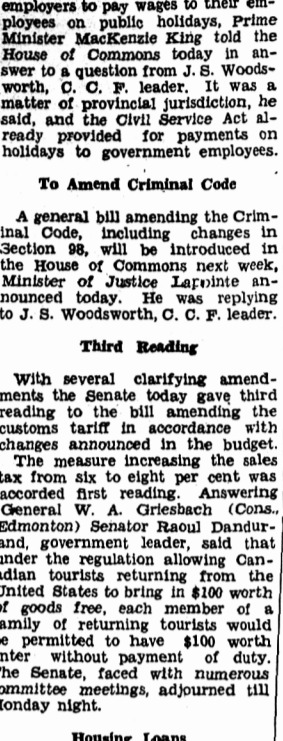

Discussion took place on the question raised by overtures from the Premier of Szechwan, Pictou, P. E. I., and Inverness, N.S., making a complaint against the method followed by the board of home missions and religious education in appointing a successor to Rev. Dr. J. W. McConnell, who has retired from the office of home mission superintendent. Rev. Dr. A. H. Campbell, of Windsor, N. S., reported for the special committee to consider the overtures. The finding expressed the belief that a strong opinion prevailed that such appointments should have been done temporarily done away with and suggested that the board might have acted irregularly in making the appointment of a joint superintendent of home missions and religious education until the conference had opportunity to express its mind.

It was decided to lay the matter on the table until after the report of the home mission committee had been received.

Rev. A. A. MacLeod, field secretary for the Sons of Temperance in Nova Scotia, addressed the conference on the liquor question and appealed for the whole-hearted support of the United Church in the promotion of total abstinence and abolition of the traffic.

By a standing vote the conference unanimously nominated Rev. Dr. Charles MacKinnon, principal of Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, for the moderatorship of the General Council meeting in Ottawa next September.
