

East Kings Fishermen Are Doubtful Starters

Hon. Leo Rooster, provincial minister of fisheries, said last night, for most sections of the Island, lobster fishermen will in no way be hampered by the presence of ice, when they come to start laying lobster traps this morning.

From St. Peter's Bay west, an ice patrol revealed that no ice is in evidence, and that any ice which may be clinging to gulf waters, even if a change in the wind direction does come, is unlikely to effect that section of the north shore.

Yesterday's patrol disclosed that from a point about three miles off St. Peter's Bay, there is a heavy wedge of ice which extends eastward across to right on the Cape Breton shore.

Off North Lake this stretch of ice at its closest point is about 12 miles off shore. But it was reported that the wind appeared to be starting to swing around more to the north. Although it does not appear to be building up any force, it would still be enough to cause the ice to drift back to shore along northern Kings County.

If this does take place, it may mean that from Naufrage to East Point, lobster fishermen may not be able to do much trap setting.

The minister said that there is a great deal of heavy ice hard on the Cape Breton shore reaching southward, a almost filling George's Bay. The width of this field ranges from seven to 12 miles.

East of a line connecting Souris and Cape George, the minister said there is a fair amount of broken ice patches, reaching from the live over to the heavy shore ice. But small fishing boats would have no difficulty navigating through the broken ice, providing the proper precautions are taken, he said.

Mr. Rooster said that for any fishing boats to attempt to go north from Souris toward East Point would be in all probability a very tricky and hazardous operation, one that might well end up in disaster.
