### Not Stem Rust But "Septoria"

The island oat crop has been considerably affected by Septoria, commonly called "black stem" because of the discoloration which appears at the affected area. Centennial at the Charlottetown Experimental Farm are of the opinion that this fungus which attacks the leaves and stems of the oats is becoming more prominent on the island each year.

The disease has a tendency to weaken the oat straw causing it to be flattened more easily by wind. It is also noted that plants affected with Septoria will become brittle in dry weather and break. Anything that tends to retard the growth of the plant as mentioned above has the effect of producing a poor kernel.

Farm officials point out that the island crop is not affected by stem rust. They state that Septoria, although having an adverse effect on the growth of the grain, cannot be considered as serious a disease as stem rust.

### HANGING FLOWER BASKETS FOR CENTENNIAL YEAR DECORATIONS

A replica of the renowned hanging flower baskets in the City of Victoria, B. C. will form a part of Charlottetown's decorations during Centennial Year. It has been announced by the Centennial decorations committee that the central business section of the City, including both sides of Queen Street from City Hall to Richmond, the north side of Grafton from Hughes' corner to the Bank of Nova Scotia, the south side of Kent Street from Great George to Queen, the north side of Richmond from Queen to Great George, and Great George from Grafton to Kent, are the areas tentatively slated for decorating.

The making of the baskets will be carried out by Bruce Stewart and Company. They will be 18 inches in diameter and 18 inches deep. Mr. Wilfred Smith, manager of West End Nurseries, has consented to make up the flower baskets which will contain ivy, petunias and other climbing plants.

Each basket will hold about 80 pounds of earth; they will be lined with moss and have a basin or pan at the bottom to hold the water which will be supplied by the City as needed.

Merchants who have been contacted regarding the proposed decoration scheme, which was originated by Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy, have been most enthusiastic. The baskets will hang at eye level about two feet from a light or telephone pole and the merchant whose business is adjacent to it will be asked to contribute the sum of \$12 which is the actual cost of installing each one.

The light and telephone companies have been approached and have indicated their willingness to co-operate and at the same time have assured the decorations committee that all the poles in the uptown areas will receive a complete new paint job.
