She feels that she can watch the progress of Japan from Canada with a much calmer mind than in the country itself. Kazuko says, "I love Japan and Japanese history. I have been brought up in Japanese beautiful tradition and custom. I can do flower arrangements, one of Japanese beautiful tradition and I love it very much. (But I am not a Buddhist.)"

The actual purpose of Kazuko's letter is that she wants somebody to bring her to Canada to study or work, anything, as long as she gets here. She says, "I never mind if the duration be ever so long or so short. If you make me study abroad I am as happy as happy can be. But if it would be impossible to study abroad would you mind giving me any work, any work will do—for example an interpreter, a member of a company or your maid. I am sure I will accomplish admirably all work I am given by doing my best." Kazuko says that she has much more to tell about her life and school records. She closes her request by saying, "I am looking forward to a nice letter from nice you with impatience."

**Expo 67 Advertising Drive Aimed At New York In May**

MONTREAL (CP)—The Montreal 1967 world's fair should soon be a household word to New Yorkers because of a high-gear advertising campaign scheduled to start in New York May 16.

Expo 67 officials believe the new campaign will bring the fair's name to the attention of some 20,000,000 persons in the New York area.

The campaign is being carried out in conjunction with the well-known Macy's department store chain. It will run for seven weeks, from May 16 to July 2 and will include a main display in the Herald Square store with supporting promotions in 11 other New York area Macy outlets.

The 20,000,000 figure is based on 2,000,000 seeing the store displays plus another 18,000,000 covered by the advertising budget.

The main display in the Herald Square store will cover 5,000 square feet on the fifth floor and will have for the theme "Expo 67—Canada today."

There will be a central Expo display surrounded by displays by Air Canada, Hertz Rent-a-Car, American Express, the Canadian government showing its participation in Expo, the centennial commission and other organizations.

Other smaller displays will be spread throughout the store. Every one of Macy's 42 windows along 34th and Fifth avenues will carry Expo feature mention for the May 16 opening and 10 will carry continuous Expo notices throughout the seven-week period.

Mr. Break said Expo and Macy's are hoping to get billboard space on "the big sign off Herald Square. It's six storeys high and two-sided. It will cost \$5,000 to get it painted."

He said one of the best aspects of the deal for Expo is that Macy's and its 11 other outlets will carry promotional advertising in New York newspapers, every day during the seven-week period.

If Expo advertised on its own account in the New York papers it would cost them from two-fifths to one-half more, he said.

Because Macy's and other big department stores have long-term advertising contracts with newspapers giving them cheaper rates, the cost to Expo would not be so high as normal.
