St. David's Church Observes Anniversary At Georgetown

The 122nd anniversary of St. David's Church, Georgetown was celebrated Sunday, July 26th, with services in the morning and the evening.

The guest preacher, Rev. John Hardy, M.A., B.D., Ph. D., Pine Hill Divinity Hall, brought impressive and inspiring messages from the Old Testament. In the morning his text was, "Now Obadiah feared the Lord Greatly" (Kings 18:3). In the evening, "Let us rise up and build" (Nehemiah 3:18) was the text.

At the evening service, Dr. Hardy was assisted by Rev. J. M. Fraser of Montague.

The special music under the direction of the organist, Harry Yorston was by the Georgetown choir with Miss Ariens MacDonaid, Southport, as guest soloist at the morning service and the Brooklyn Trio assisting in the evening.

Beautifully rendered solos by Miss MacDonaid and harmonious trios by Willard Bruce, John Bears and Malcolm Munroe added much to the spiritual atmosphere of the day.

Sincere thanks were tendered by Rev. J.M. Fraser to Dr. Hardy for his messages; to the choir and guest singers and to all who helped in the success of the day. St. David's goes forward in its second century in quiet confidence to grapple with its various tasks both material and spiritual.

Rash Of Weekend Breaks Continue

MONTAGUE—A series of thefts and breaks reported at Montague and Vernon Saturday night seem to follow the same pattern as a series of similar breaks and thefts in the St. Peter's and Morell area the previous weekend.

In each case a truck was taken from Charlottetown and after several breaks into service stations and other business premises, the thieves apparently switched to another stolen car for the return trip to the capital.

Three breaks at Montague and several at Vernon Saturday night or early Sunday morning are thought to be tied in with the

theft of an International Harvester Truck stolen from the Maritime Auto Supply, Charlottetown. The truck was left at MacGowan Motors, Ltd., Montague from where a 1950 Pontiac was stolen. The thieves forced an entry to the building by smashing a large window at the rear of the building.

An attempt by the thief or thieves, to open the safe with a large hammer failed and it is not known yet whether anything in the building is missing.

The mode of entry in the second break at Montague was made in the same manner at MacPhee and Fraser's service station, from where \$30 was taken from the cash register.

SCALP LACERATED

Girl Struck By Propeller Escapes Serious Injury

SUMMERSIDE — A 17-year-old Cape Traverse girl narrowly escaped serious injury yesterday morning, when struck on the head by a whirling propeller of a light aircraft.

The girl, Miss Clarissa MacDonald, was taken to the Prince County Hospital in Summerside with a scalp laceration. Her condition was reported as satisfactory last evening.

The girl, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William MacDonald of Cape Traverse is reported to have just landed from the Piper aircraft

after an early morning flight from Portage, when she walked into the still rotating propeller blades.

John Busby, a young man from Toronto, and pilot of the plane, had been visiting at the MacDonald home in Cape Traverse, and had flown from there yesterday morning to pick up Miss MacDonald who had been visiting overnight with friends in Portage.

On arriving back at Cape Traverse the girl was walking past

the front of the aircraft when the propeller which was still rotating, struck her a glancing blow on the head which reportedly knocked her to the ground and caused a scalp laceration which resulted in loss of considerable blood.

The accident occurred near Hardy's Store in Cape Traverse in a field owned by Clifford Dawson, where the plane had landed. The injured girl was taken to hospital by Cliff MacDougall whose home was near where the plane had landed.

reporter said she had tears in her eyes as she turned to walk up the ramp and into the sleek jet plane.

She entered the aircraft at exactly 11:35 p.m. ADT. It moved off six minutes later and was airborne at 11:45. Five hours and 55 minutes later it was in London.

The Queen had originally planned to return to England aboard the royal yacht Britannia, in which she had spent many of her nights in eastern Canada. But after her illness in the Yukon it was decided to fly home instead.

Minutes after the royal barge returned from its trip across the harbor it was taken aboard the Britannia and the luxurious ship moved off on her trip to Britain.

HALIFAX HOME
Ancient Government House, the residence of Lt.-Gov. E. C. Plow, was the Queen's headquarters during her stay in Halifax. It was there that she and Prime Minister Diefenbaker signed documents making official the appointment of Gen. Vanier to succeed Vincent Massey as representative of the sovereign in Canada. And it was in the same building that the Queen later met with her Canadian privy council, members of the federal cabinet, to consider several other undisclosed matters.

Later the Queen was driven to historic Citadel Hill where her color—a special white ensign of silk with a crown and royal cypher, a red, white and blue silk cord and gold tassels—was presented at a colorful, impressive ceremony.
