Training Ships In Montague

MONTAGUE — Three bird-class patrol ships arrived in Montague yesterday about 3:00 p.m. and are staying in port until this morning while in port they are guests of the town of Montague and were taken to Kings Theatre at Georgetown where they enjoyed the comedy 'The Marriage Go Round'.

The three ships, Mallard, Cormorant and Loon, are units of Maritime Command and are based at Halifax.

These Alton patrol craft are employed this summer in providing sea training for RCN cadet midshipmen.

During the three summer months 10 cadets, all of whom are in their third year at service colleges and Canadian universities, will undergo a period of practical shipboard training.

Four separate cruises are being carried out to ports in the Atlantic Provinces and Gulf of St. Lawrence under the immediate direction of Lt. G.J. Comeau, Truro, N.S.

The ships are primarily of wood and aluminum construction, are fitted with sonar and carry modern navigational equipment. They are officially rated as small patrolcraft and have been employed in the past on search and rescue duties.

Twenty-four officers and men are on board at Montague with ten midshipmen and they will shortly be joined by an additional 24 midshipmen. The three ships are under the command of William Stead and Sub-Lieut. Ted Kelly.

From Montague they will proceed to Shediac, Shippigan, Richouctou, Charlottetown, Summerside and Alberton for Aquatic Day celebrations.

Winsloe Herd Has Highest Maritime Avg.

The registered Guernsey herd of Leigh Temple, Winsloe, P.E.I. is reported by the Canadian Guernsey Breeders Association, Guelph, Ontario as having the highest herd average in the Maritime Provinces for the R.O.P. testing year 1964-1965.

The Burlington herd owned by the Charlottetown druggist, comprised of 15 cows, averaged 9747 lbs. of milk and 498 lbs. of butterfat in 305 days on twice daily milking and had B.C.A.'s averaging 127M 130F. The records included six over 10,000 lbs. of milk and seven over 500 lbs. of butterfat. The highest record reported was that for Wally Dianne's Glenda who made 17,321 lbs. of milk and 803 lbs. of butterfat in 321 days.

'Glenda' is Island bred having been purchased from her breeder, John Doberty, Winsloe. Her sire was bred by Guy Roddy Brackley.
